

BANK WRECKED BY INFERNAL MACHINE PHILADELPHIA

(Serious Telegraph Service.) PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—The case he was refused money by President Bushon, an unknown anarchist set off an infernal machine in the Fourth National bank building shortly before noon today, causing an explosion which killed two and injured a score of persons and completely wrecked the building and the Bullitt building adjoining. The dead: CASHIER McLEAR, of the Fourth National bank; UNKNOWN ASSASSIN, who set off the infernal machine.

Seriously injured: Wm. Krupp, news porter, half of face blown away, eyes blown out, and body terribly burned and mangled. Will die. T. A. Hoesbach, bank employe, badly burned; may die. A slight fire followed the explosion. No damage was done beyond the bank and Bullitt buildings. A heavy police guard was thrown about the ruins after the explosion, for the purpose of guarding the cash and securities of the bank. The financial district was crowded at the time of the explosion and a panic followed.

HOODLUMS HURT WOMAN

Snowballing by about 20 young hoodlums at Fifth av. and Pike st. at 11:30 o'clock last night nearly resulted in a fatal injury to Miss Edna McGrew, of Fremont, while being taken home by friends in an automobile. The party was going up Pike st. and when near the corner of Fifth av. the hoodlums, who had concealed themselves around the corner, began shooting in the automobile and bombarding the party with snowballs.

The chauffeur became confused by the onslaught and lost control of the machine, which plunged into the building at the corner of Fifth av. and Pike st. Miss McGrew was thrown forward and sustained severe injuries about the head. She was carried to the Stone drug store and Dr. W. McDowell called. Later she was taken to her home in Fremont. Dr. McDowell reports her condition as painful although not serious.

ALASKA POSSE AFTER MURDERER

Lever was taken to the hospital and died one hour after the shooting. BETTER LAWS ARE WANTED

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney George Vanderveer this morning wrote to Gov. Mead recommending that radical modifications be made in the text of certain obsolete criminal statutes now upon the books of Washington. He recommended the appointment of a commission by the governor to inquire into the matter, and will attempt to secure legislation at the coming meeting of the state lawmakers.

Mr. Vanderveer recommends the amendment of the statute defining the embezzlement of partnership funds to be made constitutional. He asks that that action for the protection of builders be amended, and that certain faulty game laws, now difficult of interpretation, be simplified and made practicable. He asks, further, that the statute defining the overdraft of bank accounts be clearly and accurately set forth.

CAN'T KEEP OUT OF JAIL

OVERLAND TRAINS HELD UP

Snow storms, wrecks and landslides on the Northern Pacific and Great Northern lines has held up all overland trains. A wreck on the Northern Pacific near Argo last night held up all local trains for many hours. At 10 o'clock the only Northern Pacific train to arrive in Seattle came in from North Bend. This is a local train.

The Great Northern fast mail and the Oriental limited trains, due from St. Paul yesterday, have not arrived, and nothing is known as to when they will reach Seattle. All of yesterday's Northern Pacific overland trains are due to arrive today, according to statements of officials.

DECLARE HE TOOK POISON.

A painter, whose name is said to be Ernest Sharin, of 2504 Fifth av., was taken in the ambulance to the Wayside hospital about 1 o'clock today, evidently having attempted suicide by taking some sort of poison.

Sharin was found wandering around Pike st. at the corner of Fourth av. A bottle of unknown liquid was found on his person, and also some codine, which is a deadly poison. The man either could not or would not talk. He only muttered "Take me to my wife, my wife."

LID IS NOW ON IN CITY OF BALLARD

(Star Special Service.) BALLARD, Jan. 5.—The lid is on in Ballard. Under the new administration all gambling, both prohibited and the police will see to it that the new order is not broken. The saloon proprietors have been notified that if any liquor is sold to minors, the saloonkeepers will be prosecuted. Last night Chief Nabors, of the police department, gave orders that the women who have been making their living around the saloons will have to pack their goods and, if they are not out of town by Monday night, the police will arrest and prosecute them to the full extent of the law.

SEATTLE OUT OF COAL TODAY

The coal situation today in Seattle is worse than it has been for months. There is practically no coal in the city. The bunkers of the Pacific Coast company are cleaned up, even to the sweeping. One hundred tons of nut and four cars of Fulton and Newcastle were all that were received today, and this amount was snapped up early. The Carbonado company received no coal today. The cold weather has created an unusual demand and with the shortage the situation is more acute than since the present trouble began. Several large firms have received shipments from the east in order to carry on their business.

CHICAGO SCHOOL AUTHORITIES WILL TAKE FOOTBALL BOYS TO TASK FOR SEATTLE ACTIONS.
