

# POWDER WRECKS TRAIN TWENTY-SEVEN DIE

(Seattle Telegraph Service.)  
**YERRE HAUTE, Ind., Jan. 21.**—The explosion of a car of powder on the Big Four railroad at Sanford, completely wrecked passenger train No. 3, which was passing the freight train at Sanford. Twenty-seven bodies have been recovered and it is thought that even more may die. The number of persons injured, and many of these may die. The dead and injured were removed to this city, where those still living are receiving the greatest care at the hospital.  
 The powder is thought to have been exploded by concussion caused by the passing passenger train. The train was hurled into pieces, and nothing remains on the scene today save a mass of ruins which a wreckage crew is clearing away as rapidly as possible.  
 Many victims who miraculously escaped injury otherwise, were crushed.
