

NEW YORK MINISTER DEALS HARD BLOW TO JOHN D.

NEW YORK, April 27.—A strong and picturesque figure has been added to the church forces of New York by the coming of Rev. Chas. Frederic Aked from Liverpool. He is pastor of the Fifth av. Baptist church. It is the church attended by John D. Rockefeller, when he is in the city, and is the rendezvous of John D. Jr.'s celebrated bible class. It is popularly known as Rev. Rockefeller's church, but Rev. Aked objects vigorously to that title.

"It is not fair to call it Rockefeller's church," he says. "Mr. Rockefeller is not a member of the church, but he is a seat holder and member of a congregation in Cleveland. Young Mr. Rockefeller is a member of the church, a trustee and leader of the bible class."

Rev. Aked invited the stewards, freemen, engineers and all the rest of the crew of the steamer that brought him to America to attend services at his church.

"I want to make a cosmopolitan congregation," said the minister, "like the one I had in Liverpool. My mission is the ministry of reconciliation. I want the shop girl and the workman to come to the Fifth av. Baptist church. They will be welcome. It is not a millionaires' church. The shop girls will find themselves thoroughly at home there and will discover hundreds of my parishioners to welcome them."

On the question of world peace he makes this declaration:

"I regard myself as a mild-mannered man, but a man must have fighting blood in his veins to stand up for peace. The Quakers were always good fighters. Any fool can acquiesce. If you want uniformity you can get it in a graveyard."

The cause of international peace has been preached every year from my pulpit and will continue to be. The solution is arbitration. Let there be a mutual agreement among nations not to increase armament beyond the present level and simultaneously, perhaps, a permanent court could be established to which

the nations could submit their disputes. The people all over the world want peace."

In response to a request for a word of advice to young folks he quoted Whittier's "Identify yourself with some righteous but unpopular cause" for young men and Goethe's "Enthusiasm alone makes life immortality" for young women.

Rev. Aked was for 15 years pastor of Pembroke chapel, and he made it Liverpool's most famous church. His career there was wonderfully successful in every way. His congregation was made up of all classes and he called it a Noah's ark of spiritual humanity. He was at the head of a crusade that in a few months drove 800 Liverpool low resorts out of business.

Rev. Aked is tall, strong, genial and enthusiastic. He bears some resemblance to President Roosevelt, especially in his smile and his manner. In his younger days he achieved fame as a cyclist, swimmer and football player.
