

# CANNOT FIX BLAME

**CORONER'S JURY IN SHRINERS' WRECK REPORTS THAT DIRECT CAUSE FOR DISASTER CANNOT BE DETERMINED.**

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., May 14.—Great dissatisfaction results over the finding of the coroner's jury in the cause of death of 32 members of the Shriners' train which was wrecked Saturday afternoon. After hearing testimony from many witnesses the jury returned the following verdict: "We, the coroner's jury, find that O. B. Kauffman, of Reading, Pa., came to his death at Honda in Santa Barbara county, California, on or about May 11, 1907, from the following causes, to-wit: "The wrecking of a special Shriners train making the run from Santa Barbara north, the extreme cause of the wreck unknown and it cannot determine any direct cause for said wreck."
