

# FRAUDS

 WASHINGTON, D. C., May 24.—The states will be stirred within a few days by indictments of big frauds for past land frauds. The frauds, it is alleged, will involve the names of prominent men in the high in business and political circles. They include: One United States senator, one former United States senator, a man reputed to be one of the wealthiest men in the world, a railroad man, known from the Atlantic to the Pacific; two of the wealthiest lumber barons in the United States; numerous smaller operators and men at the head of the companies.

These frauds, it is declared in an official quarter, extend into a number of states, including California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Minnesota, the Dakotas and Colorado.
