

THE ORCHARD TRIAL

(Continued from page 1.)

had arrived when outside work must be done.

Haywood said Gov. Steunenberg must be put out of the way. Orchard declared that four or five men detailed to kill Steunenberg had failed.

He declared Haywood told him that after he got Steunenberg he would have written from Patterson, N. J., to Bell, Peabody, Gabbert and others, warning them that they would get the same dose.

It was finally agreed that Orchard would go to Caldwell and look over the ground and decide how the job could be done.

Haywood told Orchard he had sent Arthur Boston, Ed. Minster and Steve Adams to Caldwell, and all had tried to kill Steunenberg, but failed.

Boston and Minster were members of the Western Federation of Miners.

At this time Orchard swore Steve Adams was working with Simpkins, near Wallace, Idaho, trying to get rid of men who jumped Simpkins' claims.

Julian Steunenberg said behind the alleged plot to kill his father, and he displayed considerable emotion at times.

Orchard, continuing, declared that Adams had told him he had killed a man named Tyler on Marble Creek, who jumped Simpkins' claims. As other claim jumpers did not take warning, he shot another man named Worley, and tried to kill the latter's companion, but he escaped.

Defense Makes Objection. The defense here objected to permitting the evidence being introduced, declaring that claim jumping cases had no bearing on the alleged conspiracy or the murder of Steunenberg.

Attorney Richardson declared that the prosecution was taking advantage of the leniency of the judge to introduce matters which later would be stricken out, but which would have had its effect on the jury.

Judge Wood declined to rule on the matter until later on. At this point the noon recess was taken.

Afternoon Session. The crowd that besieged the doors this afternoon was much larger than yesterday. It is estimated that more than 1,900 unsuccessfully tried to secure admission to the court room. Women and girls, not yet out of their teens, predominated.

Orchard had materially benefited by his noon rest, and was in his best voice and condition since he has taken the stand.

The court overruled the motion of the defense to strike out references to the claim jumping case.

Yesterday Afternoon's Testimony. The most important testimony given at the session yesterday afternoon was that Orchard had followed Gov. Peabody, of Colorado, about for weeks, hoping that Steve Adams would get a favorable opportunity to kill him.

Orchard told of how he and Adams were given sawed-off shot guns which they could carry beneath their coats, money and clothes by Pettibone. He said that the attempted assassination of Gov. Peabody was delayed until after the executive board of the miners had finished its session.

Orchard told of the murder of Lyte Gregory, a deputy sheriff, in Denver, by himself, in company with Adams, in the office of a big accident insurance company. "I want to insure my ankles for—"

For the murder of Gregory he received \$100 the next day from the miners' headquarters and received money after that right along.

After the killing of Gregory in Denver, Adams went back to Cripple Creek. Orchard remained in Denver and attended the convention of the Western Federation of Miners.

At 2 p. m. Hawley said he was feeling ill and court adjourned until this morning.

Peabody Says Nothing. KANSAS CITY, June 6.—Gov. Peabody today declined to discuss Orchard's attempts to kill him. Peabody says he has been subpoenaed as a witness, and expects to reach Boise in a few days.

Although indicted by the Portland grand jury for alleged participation in the Portland "Furniture trust," the well known firm of Frederick & Nelson, of Seattle, has never been informed of what possible charges can be made against it, and is very certain that it is not involved in any trust.

Mr. D. E. Frederick, president of Frederick & Nelson, told a reporter for The Star today, that the action of the grand jury in indicting the firm was a surprise. Portland persons deliberately lied before the grand jury.

"I might as well be indicted for robbing a bank as far as knowing anything about it is concerned," said Mr. Frederick. "We have no business in Oregon whatever, except an occasional order for some local furniture here, and it has always been common knowledge that we believe in active competition, and have always been perfectly frank with the public in all dealings. The idea of our being mixed up in any furniture trust, is ridiculous. I am very sorry that the Portland jury should have been deceived into mixing us up in the matter, because it cannot help prejudicing many people unjustly."

Indicted in Frisco
