COLVILLE, June 12.—Ernest Hessner, in whose case on a trial for murder the jury disagreed and were discharged, was brought into court on an application for bail, and the application was allowed, the bond being fixed at \$10,000. Hessner immediately communicated the fact to his friends at Leon Lake, and the news came back that the bail bond in the full amount would be returned immediately, and it is expected that he will be released in a day or two.


TO DISSOLVE THE DOUMA.

COST OF G. N.

OLYMPIA, June 12.—The entire session yesterday of the Washington State Railroad Commission was taken up by listening to the report of Engineer H. P. Gillette. His evidence was given to fix the railroad valuations in this state. The summary of the cost of the Great Northern as given by Mr. Gillette is as follows:
Construction \$18,380,304.30
Fairhaven & Southern 1,576,757.17
Seattle terminal improvement—
Freight station 73,664.23
Passenger station 277,379.53
Terminal tracks 27,386.41
Tunnel 2,038,590.58
Everett tunnel 132,106.43

Cost of Seattle & Northern 1,500,000.00
Construction cost \$26,530,409.99
Additions and improvements 6,818,673.70
Total \$33,349,074.69
Total mileage in state 537.7 miles, making the cost per mile \$61,650.
The total cost of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company lines in this state, including \$74,953.79 for betterments, is \$11,583,455.66, which is approximately \$23,000 a mile. The greater expense of the Great Northern is accounted for largely by reason of expensive terminals at Spokane and Seattle, and costly tunnels.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Three of America's illustrious women have taken their places at last in the Hall of Fame. At the ceremonies which formed the official addition of 11 bronze tablets to those already in place, these three women were given places of honor:
Mary Lyon, founder of Mount Holyoke college, and Maria Mitchell, professor of astronomy in Vassar college.
Before these ceremonies there were 25 famous Americans in the Hall of Fame. Now there are 39, the total for the six years since the graceful colonnade on University Heights was completed and opened.
Several wings are yet to receive the illustrious names that are still to be chosen from the past—and also those who may be boys and girls in your own neighborhood today.
The Hall of Fame undoubtedly has one of the most imposing sites of any public edifice in America. It is on a high promontory, hundreds of feet above the wide Hudson and the Harlem rivers.

JAIL FOR DEFIANT TRUST KINGS OF WALL-ST BEST REMEDY, SAYS ATTY. GENERAL

DIETRY VIOLATION OF LAWS, IMPRISONMENT OF INDIVIDUAL DEFENDANTS MORE EFFECTIVE.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—With the announcement from the attorney general's office that the administration considers as most important in anti-trust law violation the cases of the Standard Oil company, fertilizer trust, tobacco trust, powder trust, harvester combine and the hard coal trust, comes the startling statement by Atty. General J. Bonaparte, who flatly declares that the remedy for trust evils is the imprisonment of trust magnates who violate the law.
"This is the attorney general's remarkable declaration," an air purveyor in another federal judicial district party to a suit in the district named. "The court handed down a decision that the government could do so."
