

SEATTLE DERBY NEXT SATURDAY

Big Classic Will Have Speedy Field, and Is Attracting Much Attention—Selling War Continues—Lucky Ones Bet on Glorio at 100 to 1.

The next stake on the program of the King County Fair association is the Seattle Derby, which will be contested next Saturday. The distance is one mile and a quarter, for three year olds and the race is attracting more general interest in this vicinity than ever before. At present it is impossible to say just how many horses will go to the post, but it is not thought that more than half a dozen will face the starter.

The most prominent candidate and one that will probably go to the post favorite is Edwin T. Fryer, who is the property of F. Walhauser. This colt has been improving with every start and is being better the further the distance he will probably be the horse to beat for the big race. Woolma, from the stable of Applegate & Colton seems to be Fryer's most dangerous rival and as his last race here was an impressive one, the colt will no doubt give a good account of himself in the Seattle classic.

Vox Populi, whom it was thought would be a dangerous contender, seems to have lost all the form that made him a great race horse in California and the east, and it is problematical if he will go to the post in the big event. Vox Populi has started here four times and on each occasion has run badly and failed to finish inside the money.

E. G. Bedwell has brought Judge Nelson all the way from Denver to start in the Derby and if this colt runs up to his Los Angeles form he will take a race horse to beat him. Treasure Seeker, from the barn of George Wentworth, has been improving up here and his owner may take a chance at the Derby with him, as the colt seems to like a distance of ground.

Matt Ries will start Miss Officious, and she stands better than an outside chance of getting home in front. Other candidates that may face the starter are Kruka, May L. N. Aftermath, Johnny Lyons, Arcourt, Alta Sping and Grace G.

ter is now out looking for trouble. All in all this meeting promises to be an interesting one for any owner placing his horses where they do not belong or entering them for amounts below their real value.

Say fellow dopsters, do you know that Kermit ran a better race Saturday? A mile and an eighth in 1:53 is stepping some and this old Kermit, who is nine years old, made the pace all the way and incidentally stepped the first mile in 1:40 flat. Kermit ran a better race than Orlesne, who won the free handicap, as she only had 98 pounds up and ran the mile in the same time while Kermit had up 109 pounds. How fast do you suppose Kermit would have run with 98 pounds on his back?

After Glorio had won the Woodlands handicap there were all kinds of stories afloat about the fellows who had secured the top price of 100 to 1 against the colt. Trainer Buxton of the Fleur de Lis stable was one of the lucky ones as he bet \$5 against \$500 and the Hobo Kid (C. R. Heath), who trains for Ringstrom, did the same thing. Some unknown better cashed a ticket \$1,000 against \$10 with Bookmaker Jackson. Billy King, the sheetwriter, got aboard at 60 to 1, betting \$5 against \$300, and it is understood that Owner W. P. Fine bet \$40 straight on his colt at odds of 40 to 1. All in all it was a great victory for the clockers and horsemen, but the general public did not share in the melon cutting, as most of them had never even heard of Glorio and half of them did not know he was in the race.

Before the running of the Woodlands, Matt Ries thought Herives would win sure and backed her from 10 to 1 to 6 to 1. After the race he felt much chagrined as he never figured on a maiden like Glorio coming to life and winning, and Herives, by running second, beat all the contenders he had figured on.

Herives was bred by Barney Schreiber at his Woodlands farm in Missouri.

Five favorites were beaten in succession Saturday and the books all told a race horse to beat him. Treasure Seeker, who had been claimed from C. C. McCafferty the first time she started and her worthy former owner has had blood in his eye ever since. He claimed Pastoso Saturday, after kidding up Kermit, and says he is on the war path.
