"U" TO TURN FUNDS OVER TO STATE

A statement comes from A. P. Sawyer, president of the board of regents of the state university, to the effect that the board will comply with the law enacted by the last legislature providing for remittance to the state treasurer of all state funds now held or to be held in the future by the board.

The present board of regents is not in favor of the accumulation of any funds in the hands of the registrar, or the expenditure of any money except that for prescribed legal purposes. Under the present law expenses will have to be paid from the general maintenance fund and the receipts turned over to the state treasurer. Upwards of \$5,000 is now held by Registrar Condon credited to various funds.
