


THRILLING BATTLE FOR LIFE IN A BALLOON OVER OCEAN DEEPS.

DARING AERONAUT, LOST OVER SEA, SUFFERS TERRIFYING EXPERIENCE AND IS AT LAST MIRACULOUSLY SAVED FROM DEATH IN WASTE OF WATERS.

(Seattle Star's Exclusive Service.) VALENCIA, Aug. 27.—One of the most wonderful and thrilling escapes in the history of ballooning— even more hair-raising than the adventure of Santos-Dumont several years ago, when he fell into the

Mediterranean with his airship— was that encountered a few days ago by Capt. Kindelan, of the Spanish military engineer corps. In the course of a series of experiments and maneuvers he ascended from this place in the military balloon Marie Theresa, and unexpectedly soon found himself being blown out across the Mediterranean.

To be lost in that mighty expanse of water meant death, of course. Terrified, Capt. Kindelan attempted to hook his trailing rope in the rigging of a passing ship, but in vain. The crew of the ship tried with

all their might to seize the rope, realizing the imminent peril of the aeronaut, but all to no avail. Lower and lower drifted the balloon, farther and farther out. Knowing that certain death awaited him if he clung to his air craft, Capt. Kindelan buckled on his life-belt and jumped into the sea. All around him were miles and miles of ocean; above him the sky; below—death. There was no hope save to swim and swim, in the hope that some vessel would come his way. And so, finally, one did. It was the British ship West Point. Capt. Kindelan was taken on board and finally reached home, but the balloon was lost.

MARKET ORDINANCES SENT TO COUNCIL COMMITTEE

Two ordinances proposed for the benefit of the public market were introduced last night by Councilman Revell and referred to appropriate committees. A petition from the Vashon Island Fruit Growers' association to be allowed to erect a corrugated iron structure in Pike place as well as a communication from Alice Nelson, a "teacher" of Vashon, asking that the public market be built on the waterfront, were also referred to the same committees. One of the Revell ordinances waives the provisions of the building ordinance in favor of the Goodwin Realty company and the other

authorizes the superintendent of streets to cover temporarily a portion of Pike place.

FIRST STEP TAKEN FOR BOULEVARD

The Queen Anne boulevard bill was finally passed by the city council last night. It proposes a new scenic drive way around the brow of the hill. It will be four or five miles long and will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

COUNCIL SETTLES PARK LICENSES

The question of a license for the parks and amusement centers where numbers of attractions are within one enclosure was settled last night for one year, by the introduction of an ordinance prescribing the sums to be charged. Luna park and the White City, at Madison park, are to pay \$500 for this first year and the Eden Musee, not yet opened, in the downtown district, will pay \$400. The license is an experimental one, to be tried for a year.

NEED MUCH MONEY FOR IMPROVEMENTS

Superintendent L. B. Youngs, of the light department, has in the September estimate a large amount of money to be expended for new material and work. In the list is included the following: Transformers, poles, meters, etc., \$25,000. Two ears of wire, \$25,000. Transmission line No. 2, \$10,000. No-rust lamps, \$2,000.

WIFE DESERTER CAUGHT

(Star Special Service.) ABERDEEN, Aug. 27.—W. O. Metcalf of Bellingham, who deserted a deaf and dumb wife and eight children, and eloped with a 19-year-old girl, has been arrested here. Metcalf says the girl accompanied him to California and back to Portland, and that he does not know where she is. He has a watch and rings which belong to her.

CALHOUN NOT WORRIED OVER PREVALENCE OF TYPHOID FEVER

Health Officer Calhoun estimates that there are now 250 cases of typhoid fever in this city. The health officer does not consider the situation one of great gravity. The deaths from the fever have been comparatively few. August will prove the record breaker in the entire history of the city, in the matter of number of deaths in a single month. Already the death roll exceeds last month when the list was over 180. The health officer says that the death list this month will exceed 300. Dr. Calhoun ascribes the increase in the death roll to the growth in population of the city rather than to any unusual hygienic conditions.

BARBER CUTS PATRON—BEATEN TO DEATH.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Aug. 27.—Because Ed Hides, a barber in the Canadian Soo, accidentally gashed him while cutting his hair, Thomas Ryan, a blacksmith, invited Hines into the alley and beat him to death in a fight.

LUNCHES TOO GOOD—OFFICIALS ON RACK.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 27.—Investigation into the accounts of the eight members of the executive council has been begun by District Attorney Moran. It is said the council used city money in paying for elaborate luncheons at its weekly meetings.
