

TO INVESTIGATE CANDIDATES

The Seattle Voters' League is a non-partisan organization now in process of being incorporated.

The founders of the organization are the Rev. M. A. Matthews, a number of other ministers and a number of prominent business men and labor leaders.

The purpose of the organization will be to investigate the record of every person seeking to become a candidate for public office, whether for the nomination at the primary or for the polls at the final election. His record will be published without fear or favor. If he is a morally clean man, and an honest one he ought not to object to it; if he is not the people ought to know it.

"These records will be published in the newspapers and will also be sent by mail to each voter in time to reach him several days before the primary or general election."

"No person who is a candidate for office will be eligible for membership in the Seattle Voters' League, and a member who becomes a candidate immediately loses his membership. This is necessary in order that it may not be used to boost any individual set of individuals, clique or faction."

"Non-partisanship is necessary, because we want honest and moral candidates for public office in the city, county, state or nation before any other question can be considered."

MOTHER IS LIBERATED TO CARE FOR HER BABY

With its mother an inmate of the city jail, the five-month-old baby of Lizette Carlson, an Indian woman, slept alone and unwatched in a room at the Grand Central hotel, on First av. S., last night. No harm befell the little tot, but when its mother informed the police this morning of the helplessness of her child, she was liberated to attend to her child, though accompanied by Patrolman Keest.

The Carlson woman was arrested at the hotel last evening by Patrolmen W. DeLan and Dragner.

She made no mention of the baby and it was not until she informed the police this morning that the police knew of its existence.

The infant was found peacefully sleeping in bed when the mother and officer reached the room and had evidently fretted very little over the absence of its mother.

When Chief Wappenstein arrived at the station he was informed of the situation and generously allowed the woman and her baby to go without the formality of a trial.
