
# IS KEEPING RIGHT AFTER THE TRUSTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The federal government has taken another step in the warfare against the trusts by attaching, under orders from Attorney General Bonaparte, \$7,999 worth of leaf tobacco consigned from Durham, N. C., to the British-American Tobacco Company, of Great Britain. The attachment took place at Norfolk, Va. The action was taken under section 6 of the Sherman anti-trust law, which authorizes the seizure and condemnation by the government of the property of any trust while in interstate or foreign commerce.
