Among them was a bill attacking the sanity of Captain Bryan.

TO TRY AND PROVE ALIBI FOR ADAMS

RATHDRUM, Idaho, Nov. 15.—The state has closed in the Adams case and Attorney Darrow has opened for the defense, setting forth that he expects to prove an alibi for his client. Darrow stated that the confession of Adams, if there ever was any, was secured under threats. He asked that this be excluded from the records of the case, but he was overruled. Witnesses for the defense are on the stand. That the notorious Harry Orchard was in the Marble Creek district in 1905, and had been in a position to become familiar with all of the facts surrounding the killing of Fred Tyler, was the feature of the testimony of Alvin Mason, a witness for the defense in the trial of Steve Adams today. This is an important point in the defense, inasmuch as it offers an explanation of Adams' confession explaining the possibility of Orchard having supplied McParland with the facts, as is claimed by the defense. Mason, who was implicated in the murder of Tyler by the Adams confession, testified that Adams was many miles from the Marble Creek region at the time it is alleged Tyler was killed. During the examination of Mason the defense attempted to show that Detective McParland had made an effort to secure a confession from him, but the state objected, and the defense then asked that the detective be recalled. McParland had left town this morning, but it was promised by the state that he would return Monday.

BAD JUDGMENT WALSH'S ONLY CRIME

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—On claims that Banker Walsh is guilty of nothing more criminal than bad judgment in misapplying \$1,000,000 of the banks funds, that banking laws are a dead letter, the millionaire's lawyers will ask for a dismissal of the present case without the submission of evidence. The defense contends that the provision of the law concerning the limitation of a loan to any individual to 10 per cent of the bank's capital is merely advisory, and declares that the entire penalty for a violation of this provision is civil liability for the loss and possible revocation of the bank's charter. The attorneys for the defense will ask the court to take the case from the jury because Walsh followed precedents set by bankers generally. This motion will be made as soon as the prosecution submits its evidence. Former employees of Walsh's banks today identified the books and stock lists.
