

WATCH THE COUNT AT THE POLLING PLACES TONIGHT

Any voter has a perfect right to watch the count of the votes in the various polling places after the polls close tonight. So that the count may be accurate and honest returns made, The Star advises that supporters of Mayor Moore take it upon themselves to watch the count. Two years ago frauds were perpetrated in the count and Mayor Moore narrowly escaped defeat. It is up to the people to see that tonight's count be an honest one. Go to the polling place at eight o'clock and stay there until the count is completed. The law gives you the right to do so, and don't allow any one to rob you of that right. Co-operate with the City Party challenger.

ELECTION IS ORDERLY AND BIG VOTE IS BEING CAST

Trouble of Minor Consequence in Only a Few Precincts—Attempt at Corruption in One Precinct Is Headed Off by City Party Candidate for Councilman in Sixth Ward.

Determined action on the part of Mayor Moore, Chief of Police Wapenstein and the committee of prominent business men in charge of the election day work for the City party, is winning for Seattle today a decent and orderly election. In a few precincts the more subservient machine republicans and inspectors have undertaken their old-time tactics of bulldozing authority, but in each instance up to noon their efforts had been promptly and effectively suppressed.

In one case, that in the First precinct of the First ward, where J. W. Hanna was in charge as inspector, an attempt was made early in the morning to deny the city party challenger, J. R. Justice, the privilege of remaining in the polling place, and it was necessary for the city party committee to procure an opinion from Corporation Counsel Calhoun before Hanna would recede from his position. The same question was raised in one other precinct, but later abandoned.

Point Not Well Taken. The point raised by Hanna was that the official challenger was not a resident of the precinct, but this, the corporation counsel held, was not necessary, provided he was properly appointed by the party committee.

At the polling place in the Fifth precinct of the First ward a big dispute attempted to get away about 11 o'clock, and was promptly ejected from the polling place by the police.

Throughout the day the police officers were in constant attendance at all the most important polling places to preserve order, and at the other polling places they were at all times within easy call. Corporation Counsel Calhoun co-operated with Mayor Moore in the efforts to provide the very best police service without in any manner whatever interfering with the free expression of legal votes.

Vote Comes in Early. In most precincts the vote came early to the polls, and, encouraged by the excellent weather, has kept coming in a steady stream throughout the day. In some of the downtown precincts, notably those in the First, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth wards, where there was a heavy fraudulent registration, the close check on matters by the city party challengers proved such a menace to those who had intended to attempt to vote refrained from doing so.

All of the downtown precincts, and most of the outlying ones, are efficiently covered with party challengers and workers representing both republican and city party organizations. In some precincts in the Fifth and Sixth wards there are from three to five city party workers in addition to the official challenger.

An interesting incident of the election in the Sixth ward was an effort on the part of the supporters of John F. Miller to negotiate with

THREE WERE SLATED FOR DEATH BY REDS

Chicago Police Claim to Have Unearthed Gigantic Plot—Would-Be Assassin's Friend Arrested, and It Is Said That He Will Confess All.

CHICAGO, March 2.—One more arrest has been made as the result of the anarchistic attempt upon the life of Chief of Police Shippy and his son and driver, Isadore Maron, a Russian Jew, was arrested at the home of Lazarus Averbuch, the dead would-be assassin. The police believe that he knows the details of the plot against the life of Shippy.

Olga Averbuch, sister of the dead man, who was arrested early last evening, and who identified the body, is being held at the Harrison st. police station, in care of a matron.

At times she is hysterical. She told the police that her brother had been deeply despondent and greatly influenced by the bitter speech recently made in Chicago by the anarchist, Lucy Parsons. He became wildly wrought up over the attitude of the police towards the proposed demonstration of the unemployed by Ben L. Reitman, and it is thought that about that time he made up his mind to kill Shippy. The direct incentive to the attack was Shippy's order suppressing a meeting at which Emma Goldman was scheduled to speak.

Denunciation of government law, order and authority in incendiary attacks and vicious appeals in newspapers and that his officers with those of the postoffice department and the immigration departments will unite in a campaign to stamp out the evil.

Next to Mayor Moore, it is anticipated that William Middleton, the candidate for comptroller, will have the largest vote on the city party ticket. APPEALS TO LODGE FOR LIBERTY

Patrick J. Beaman, Committed to Insane Asylum, Asks Improved Order of Red Men to Come to His Rescue.

Protesting to the last that he was being "railroaded" into the state insane asylum as the result of family trouble, Patrick J. Beaman was taken from the county jail by a state guard and removed to the asylum for the insane at Steilacoom.

Finding that the only recourse, if a mistake had been committed, was in resorting to the same legal tribunal which had ordered him incarcerated in the asylum, Beaman penned an appeal addressed to the local lodges of the Improved Order of Red Men, of which he is a

member. This fraternal order will investigate the proceedings and take any steps it deems proper in the case.

Wife the Complainant. Beaman was taken in charge by the police on February 29 on complaint of the wife, who alleged that he had threatened to kill her and the children. Evidence was introduced at the examination conducted by Dr. J. B. Laughery and Dr. C. M. Thomson to the effect that Beaman had pulled a revolver with the avowed intention of shooting the woman.

HARRIMAN'S DAUGHTER WEDS IN GRACE CHURCH

Fifty Police Required to Keep the Idle Curious in Line—Newly Weds Are Quite Prominent.

(By United Press.) NEW YORK, March 2.—Fifty police were required to clear the streets leading to the entrance of the fashionable Grace church today when the carriage which contained Corbella Harriman and Robert Livingston Gerry attempted to reach the portals of the structure within which they were soon to be made man and wife.

Idle and curious New York was apparently far more interested in the nuptial ceremonies of the daughter of the great railway king than in those that united Gladys Vanderbilt with Count Szechnyi. From the point of view of the police, the wedding was just twice as important. Twenty-five blue coats sufficed at the last named wedding. Fifty officiated at today's mating.

The crowd, however, was in good humor. They craned their necks to see the bride and stepped upon each other's toes to see the groom, but beyond this harmless demonstration of interest there was no evidence of the demonstration which the police feared might occur.

The ceremony was simple. At the proper moment Edward H. Harriman gave the bride away.

Marine Engineer Claims He Was Victimized by the Rex Dental Company—Alveolar Dentistry Investigated by The Star.

Claiming that he has been done a lasting injury and made to suffer great physical and mental pain on account of unskillful and unscientific dental work at the hands of William Franklin Good, a dentist employed by the Rex Dental company, John F. Brown, a marine engineer of Seattle, has instituted suit to recover \$1,985, representing expenses and damages.

J. M. Hammond, of the law firm of Hammond & Hammond, is attorney for Brown. The defendant company is one which advertises widely an alleged patented process known as "Alveolar dentistry," which is represented as less painful and more effective than the system of dentistry practiced by other dentists.

The complainant, Brown, takes issue with the company's claim, and, as proof of his assertion that he has been the victim of unskillful and painful practice, exhibits a mouth from which some teeth have been extracted, others roughly crowned and still others ground down in preparation for crowning.

Brown Became Suspicious. About a month ago Brown became suspicious of the character of the work being done in his mouth and refused to allow the alveolar dentist to proceed farther. He endeavored to effect a settlement, demanding the return of \$85, which he has paid on the work, but the alveolar dentist refused to return the money. Accordingly, Brown has started suit.

The complaint recites that Brown first consulted the Rex Dental company in January and contracted to pay them \$200 to treat his gums for the disease of pyorrhea, from which they led him to believe he was suffering, and to crown teeth which could be saved and supply bridges for those extracted.

The work proceeded, Brown being required at each visit to pay for the work done. After he had paid \$85 and suffered a great deal of pain, including sleepless nights, Brown became suspicious of the character of work being done and consulted other dentists. Six dentists who examined the work done on him by Brown that he was not suffering from pyorrhea and that the work being done on his teeth was not first class in character.

Charges Inferior Work. The complaint charges that the defendants, in doing their work, failed to remove the decayed portions of the teeth to be capped, and removed teeth which were sound, and put other teeth in condition which renders future dental work dangerous and more painful, and will necessitate greater expense and loss of time; that the work done was worthless and will have to be removed at the expense of time and money before proper work can be done, and that they treated his gums for pyorrhea at the expense of money and suffering, when no such disease existed in his mouth.

The complaint also alleges that the Rex Dental company is a foreign corporation doing business in the state of Washington, but has not complied with the laws of the state requiring corporations to file with the secretary of state a certified copy of its charter or articles of incorporation, and to appoint a resident of the state as agent to accept service of legal processes, and is therefore doing business in the state in violation of the statutory provisions.

T. W. Royal, William Franklin Good and W. P. Palmer are named as defendants in addition to the corporation. Brown, who has made a personal investigation of the company and its members, states that no such man as Dr. Rex exists.
