

Sheriff's Office Takes Day Off While Would Be Murderer Escapes.

Deputy Detailed to Catch Criminal Abandons the Chase.

Must the law take a holiday? If so there is a man who attempted murder in King county today who is escaping the consequences of his crime.

After a few hours of halfhearted work last night the pursuit of John Willard, aged 58, a farmer living in Maple Valley, at the foot of Cedar mountain, who attempted murder, according to his own wife's statement, has been dropped for the time being.

At a meeting of the health and sanitation committee last night a uniform charge for "trade collections" of garbage was decided upon.
