

# CHAFIN HERO OF SPRINGFIELD RIOTS

### Defends Life of Negro Who Is Pursued by Mob—Hit by a Brick.

 SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 15.—Eugene W. Chafin, prohibition candidate for president, who was making a public speech here at the time of the rioting last night, and was struck by a brick, today is one of the heroes of the outbreak. One of his friends, who was on the speaker's stand, today gave the following version of his participation: "Chafin was speaking when he suddenly heard a great uproar, and a negro came running toward us, followed by a wild mob of white men, who evidently were trying to kill him. They knocked the negro down several times, and in his desperation the black man climbed on the stand. "Chafin was perfectly calm. He faced the yelling mob, and, pretending to have a pistol, threatened to shoot anyone who touched the negro. He called upon them to think what they were doing. Some one in the crowd threw a piece of brick that struck Chafin on the side of the head, but he retained his composure and as he talked to the crowd the negro slipped off the back of the platform and escaped."

## REFUSE TO REDUCE ASSESSMENT

Jacob Mades, of West Seattle, reported to have made considerable money in Seattle real estate, was turned down by the board of equalization today when he asked to have the assessment on property at Madison and Spring reduced.

**DAIRYMEN TO AID PURE MILK FIGHT**  
 At the next session of the state legislature the Washington Dairymen's Protective Association will introduce a bill which will greatly aid the fight of the local health board in securing an improved milk supply.

This measure will in substance provide certain qualifications for milk inspectors, an annual test for all herds for tuberculosis, the application of the Banks system of isolation, and the boundary tubercular test for all beef cattle or the isolation of all stock shipped into the state until slaughtered.

A. E. Smith, a leading dairyman of Orilla, who has been elected president of the association, is a member of the committee which is framing the new bill.

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## MORANS MAY MOVE PLANT TO HADLOCK

Rumored That an Option Has Been Secured on Location.

The Moran Company is reported to have taken an option on the entire holdings of Samuel Hadlock, the pioneer, at Port Hadlock, as a possible future location for its immense plant.

A story comes from Port Hadlock to the effect that a representative of the local company inspected the ground last week in company with Mr. Hadlock.

At the local offices of the company it was stated that, while the question of obtaining a cheaper site had been discussed on several occasions, no particular site had been determined upon and no options had been taken.

The explanation is made that the present location of the big ship building plant is too valuable for such purposes, and involves the payment of unusually heavy taxes.

The company, it is stated, desires to get a location somewhere adjacent to Seattle, where ground can be obtained at a reasonable figure and assessed on a correspondingly cheaper valuation.

In case the company should move to Port Hadlock, the old iron plant at Irondale will probably be reopened and operated to its full capacity.

## RELIGION IN POLITICS

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## ISSUES BOOK OF HAWAIIAN TALES

Legends of Kamehameha Are Gathered by Rev. H. H. Gowen.

"Hawaiian Idylls of Love and Death" is the title of a little volume written by the Rev. Herbert H. Gowen, rector of Seattle Trinity church, and just issued from the press of the Cochran Publishing company, New York. Gathered from legends still told by older members of the fast-dying race of the mid-Pacific islands, the stories, 11 in number, are concerned mainly with incidents bearing upon the career of Kamehameha the Great, the chief of the island of Hawaii, who by a Napoleonic tour of conquest made himself in 1795 absolute ruler of the archipelago and brought the eight members of the group into a union that continued until the de-thronement of Queen Liliuokalani, nearly 100 years later.

As the author of the book says in his introduction, there was no Hawaiian before Kamehameha who possessed one-tenth his manhood or foresight.

Much the history of Hawaii, even of the comparatively recent days of this great conqueror, is shrouded in myths, and the deeds of gods and goddesses figure in the island history of Kamehameha's conquests.

Some of the tales antedate Kamehameha's time, but even they lead up to matters in which the great ruler was profoundly interested. In genuine heart interest and in beauty of conception, the stories are not surpassed even by the classic myths of Greece. The Rev. Mr. Gowen has told the "Idylls" in the splendid literary style of which he is capable, and readers are sure of an interesting hour with his latest book.
