

POSSE CAPTURES SOUND PIRATES

Taken Into Custody With Two Boatloads of Plunder.

Two alleged Sound pirates, Charles Turner, a man of 34 and R. Abbott, a boy of 15, were captured by Deputy Sheriff Joe Hill and a posse of the blues were returned to their camp with two boatloads of spoils Saturday night. Both men are now held in the King county jail. The capture of these men is believed to remove the source of an annoyance to the campers and others living along the Sound south of Hill Point and on Vashon Island, which has existed all summer. The capture of the men was the result of a two days' search by Hill and his posse. Word was received

by the sheriff's office Friday of the probable location of the pirate's camp at Miller's Beach, a short distance south of Fauntleroy. This camp was raided Friday night in the absence of the robbers, and a quantity of stolen goods identified. The camp was watched by the deputy sheriff and his posse all day Saturday. About 9 o'clock Saturday evening, the pirates returned from the Vashon side of the sound, with two row boats which it was afterward learned were stolen. Among the stolen goods captured in the camp were a couple of six shooters and a quantity of jewelry and silver spoons. There was also a sixty pound crate of butter which has been identified by F. W. Garauch, a merchant of Vashon as having been stolen from his warehouse Friday night.

GARBAGE QUESTION COMES UP TONIGHT

Council to Discuss Plan of Putting Project to Public.

A number of important measures will be brought up before the meeting of the city council tonight, among which will probably be a resolution prepared by Councilman William H. Murphy relative to referring the question of a municipal garbage collection and destruction

system to the people at the coming fall election. An ordinance will be introduced providing for an appropriation of \$1,000 to continue the present rat crusade by the health department, also \$200 for the purpose of aiding in the efforts to eradicate contagious diseases. This is the first regular meeting of the council for the past month, which has been a general vacation period for the city, and there is a lot of routine business that has accumulated.

BELIEVE HEALTH BOARD SPENDS TOO MUCH COIN

Council Will Hear How Funds of Department Are Used.

A conference will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock between Health Commissioner Crichton and the members of the city council finance committee relative to the number of inspectors now employed in the department of sanitation

and health, and also as to the expenses of the department. Several of the city councilmen have expressed the opinion that the health department is spending too much money and has too many inspectors at work. The health commissioner will be prepared to refute this statement with figures showing that with a slight increase in the number of inspectors the department is now doing three times the amount of work that the department was called upon to handle two years ago.


STRIKING MINERS ARE WHIPPED BY A MILLIONAIRE GOVERNOR

ANARCHY LET LOOSE IN BIRMINGHAM COAL MINING DISTRICT, NOT BY STRIKERS, BUT BY THE STATE'S CHIEF AUTHORITY, GOV. D. B. COMER—ATROCITIES COMMITTED AGAINST LIFE AND HOME BY SOLDIERS UNDER HIS ORDERS AND BRAVOES PAID BY MINE OWNERS.

Maybe the questions involved may be finally settled by arbitration. But on the day that the miners took up their pickets and went back to work in the big mines they had been whipped, and this is the story of how they were whipped, and why they were whipped, and of the man who whipped them.

which prevailed, the attack made on a peaceful community of miners at Republic (about 20 miles from Birmingham) is a good example. At this place a company of soldiers, militiamen of Alabama, marched on a group of tents, the temporary shelter of miners, their wives and children, and with their swords and bayonets cut the ropes, slashed the canvas and reduced all to a complete wreck. Men with loaded guns stood by to see that no one interfered. The soldiers acted under the orders of their officers, and the officers acted under orders issued by the governor.
