That the steamship Chippewa had been running at full speed on the foggy morning of September 12 before she rammed the steamer Sentinel, nearly sending the boat and her 50 passengers to the bottom, was one of the startling facts brought out at the inquiry held by Marine Inspectors Walton and Heeney this morning to determine the responsibility for the collision.

Second Mate Wm. Clark testified to the contrary. Upon questioning Second Mate William Clark the inspectors learned that the Chippewa had blown both whistles, one of which is loud and hoarse, and the other very shrill. The two unlike whistles blowing at intervals deceived Capt. Hendrickson, and was one of the leading points scored by him at the inquiry.


