

ARE SURE MURDERER JUMPED INTO OCEAN

No Trace of Lee Johnston Is Found Aboard the Victoria.

That Lee Johnston, the Alaskan miner who murdered his wife, formerly Belle Gilchrist, of Butte, Mont., and buried her dismembered body beneath the floor of his cabin at Nome, sprang overboard from the steamship Victoria on the last

trip to the north, now seems certain. When the Victoria reached port this morning, City Detectives James Byrne and H. C. Adams, together with Deputy United States Marshal Joe Warren of Nome, were on hand to scrutinize each passenger that left the vessel. No trace of Johnston was found. The officers did not search the ship.

Johnston was arrested in Seattle more than a month ago by Marshal Warren after City Detective Lee A. Harbee had unraveled most of the clues.

BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT IS SETTLED

Senator's Son, Sued by An Actress, Has Fixed It Up.

(By United Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Miss Ada Louise Lonsdale, the actress, who sued Blaine Elkins, son of United States Senator Elkins, for \$10,000 for alleged breach of promise, has settled her suit out of court, according to a story that has gained

circulation here today, following the departure of the actress for Paris.

According to the story, the actress still holds the letters and telegrams alleged to have been written to her by Elkins, and which were to have been filed in connection with the suit.

It is stated that Elkins will give Miss Lonsdale \$50 a week for the rest of her life. All her debts have been paid and a traveling companion has been furnished for her trip abroad.

"Gee, I guess we're no good—we ain't got a right to live, I s'pose! It's too bad, aln't it, that we're making a few dollars Sunday morning? It's a crime—no, it's a felony. Some of these days I s'pose we'll have

to walk up to our patrons and hand 'em a printed card sumpin like this: 'Dear Live One—I ain't got a chance if I foughora it to you that I'm sellin' papers. Read and purchase.' Or maybe the Newsboys' union had better pass a resolution compellin' us to learn the deaf and dumb alphabet. Why, we're doin' that bunch in the Frederick a favor if they only knew it. TOM LAWSON VERY ILL

Is Said to Be Suffering From a General Breakdown.

CLUE IS FOUND TO GIRL'S MURDERER

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 1.—According to a story published here yesterday in an evening paper, a mysterious postal card, addressed to the rooms occupied by Attorney David Mitchell, says that the murderer of Nora Fuller, the young girl who was enticed away from home in San Francisco several years ago and whose body was found in an empty flat on Sutter st., is living in Fruitvale canyon.

The postal card contains a minute description of the man it says is the murderer of Nora Fuller. It has been turned over to Constable Hemstead, of Fruitvale, who will begin an investigation. The rooms occupied by Mitchell were formerly the offices of a detective agency, and it is presumed the postal card was intended for this agency.

At the time of the murder suspicion fastened upon a man named Hadley, employed by a San Francisco newspaper. Hadley fled and has never since been heard of.

WILL NOT GIVE BASEBALL TODAY

Thaw out of New York state through orders issued in his bankruptcy case today began in earnest today when Trustee Roger O'Mara arrived here with his attorneys and served a writ on the sheriff, ordering him to turn Thaw over to the Pennsylvania authorities. Sheriff Lane refused. O'Mara then set out immediately for Scranton, Penn., where he will endeavor to obtain an order for the arrest of Sheriff Lane on the charge of contempt of court. It is believed the New York authorities will support the sheriff and a hot legal battle may result.

DEATH RATHER THAN DISGRACE

Young Man Who Faces Arrest Puts Bullet Into Brain.

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1.—Because he feared the disgrace of arrest, August Veen, 23 years of age, is dead here today as the result of bullet wounds, self-inflicted.

Veen remarked that he "had the blues" as he left the dinner table last night. He went at once to his room, and five minutes later a shot announced the fact that he had ended his existence by putting a bullet into his brain. He was dead before his parents reached him.

Less than 10 minutes later an officer appeared with a warrant for the arrest of young Veen. Leslie Brown, a chauffeur, charged that the young man owed him \$160 for automobile rides.

The difference between the strikers and the officials of the railroad occurred over the question of "open shop." The Canadian Pacific refuses to discharge the strike breakers, and the men refuse to work with them or return to work until they are discharged.
