

# RENOUNCES FAITH TO WED A KING

### Prettiest of Royal Girls to Adopt Catholic Faith.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Princess Patricia of Connaught, known as the prettiest girl in the British royal family, today is studying the Catholic religion, preparing to embrace that faith before becoming the bride of Manuel II, the king of Portugal. Announcement of their betrothal, it was learned today, will be made at a royal dinner party this month.

The coming marriage is pleasing to Queen Amelia, Manuel's mother, and to the Portuguese people. The young king recently caused consternation in his court by declaring that he would never consent to a marriage of state and announced that he would wed his boyhood sweetheart, the daughter of a Portuguese nobleman. The girl was requested to leave the country, and when Manuel learned of the charms of Princess Patricia he consented to carry out the wishes of his mother. King Edward is also pleased at the match and has given his consent.

# NAT GOODWIN IS GIVEN DIVORCE

### Granted on Grounds of Desertion—She Is Pleased.

RENO, Nev., Oct. 3.—Nat C. Goodwin, an actor, has been granted an absolute divorce from his wife, Jessie Dermott Goodwin, known as Maxine Elliott, by Judge Fife on the ground of desertion. There was no semblance of a contest on the part of the attorneys representing Mrs. Goodwin. Her attorneys, A. J. Shores, of New York city, and Judge Parker, of this place, did not even cross-examine Goodwin or George Weeden, who were the only witnesses. Neither did they offer any testimony on the part of the defendant. The decree of divorce and find-

ings of fact had been prepared and were signed by Judge Fife before the parties interested left the court room, making one of the shortest divorce cases ever heard in the district court, the whole proceeding occupying 11 minutes.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3.—Maxine Elliott, who is playing in this city, refused to be interviewed with reference to the divorce granted her husband, Nat Goodwin, but Manager Appleton said: "Miss Elliott is more than glad that the divorce has been granted. For several years she had contemplated bringing the action herself, but the thought has been so distasteful that she delayed action. Now that Mr. Goodwin, however, has taken the initiative in suing her for desertion, she is very much relieved."

PASADENA, Cal., Sept. 19.—Here are two families that would warm the hearts of the sturdy old pedestrian, Edward Payson Weston. They are the families of A. R. Bennett and M. E. Scofield of this city. They established a new record for long tramps in the California mountains a few days ago by making the ascent of Mt. Wilson, near Los Angeles, hauling a pony cart with bedding and camping supplies weighing 400 pounds up a nine-mile mountain road, an ascent of a mile in altitude in a single night, with Mrs. Scofield's 9-month-old babe sleeping peacefully among the blankets in 6 hours and 25 minutes.

After camping a day and a night under the trees on the top of Mt. Wilson, with the Pacific ocean 6,000 feet below, the return trip was made successfully in the heat of the afternoon.

The motive power for the cart was furnished by Mr. Bennett and Mr. Scofield hauling in front and Earle Bennett, the 15-year-old son of the former pushing behind. The route was over the newly constructed roadbed of the Mt. Wilson solar observatory and the narrow three-quarter inch tires of the cart cut deeply into the unspaced surface.

Mrs. Bennett, Mrs. Scofield, 11-year-old Eliza Bennett, 5-year-old Theodore Bennett, who walked three-fourths of the distance barefooted, finished with flying colors.
