

# SAYS RATE DISCRIMINATES AGAINST SEATTLE

### New Tariff Will Hurt Trade With Western Washington.

The advance in rates by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific that goes into effect on November 1, is regarded as a discrimination against Seattle, inasmuch as other shipping centers can ship to interior points cheaper than this city.

The present rate, for instance, is 7 1/2 cents per cwt. on all classes. The new tariff shows: Fifth class, 12 1/2 cents; fourth class, 15 cents; third class, 18 cents, and the second and first with proportionate advances. Had the transportation bureau been organized sooner this advance might have been forestalled, or the rate prevented from being advanced to such an extent.

# STEAMER RAIDED

### Chileans Loot a Loaded German Boat and Make Escape.

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—The British steamship Stratford, which arrived here today from Chile, reports a successful raid by Chilean coast pirates on the German steamer Berato, in the harbor of Antofagasta, on the night of September 28. The cutting out expedition was done almost under the guns of a Chilean gunboat. Pursuit was given, but the bandits took to the hills back of Antofagasta and escaped.
