STANLEY KETCHEL IS SUED FOR BREACH OF PROMISE

YOUNG WOMAN SAYS THAT THE CHAMPION WOODEN THEN SPURNED HER.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 8.—By U. P.—Stanley Ketchel today has retained attorneys to aid him in escaping a breach of promise suit for \$10,000 damages brought by Miss Elizabeth Houtman of this city. Stanley was arrested yesterday afternoon and held until he had fur-

nished \$10,000 bail as a guarantee for his appearance in court. Miss Houtman says in her complaint that she became acquainted with Ketchel a year ago and that he paid her ardent court, promising to marry her on Jan. 20 of last year. She says that the engagement continued until July of last year, when he suddenly broke his betrothal vows and refused to marry her. Miss Houtman is the daughter of

a Grand Rapids workingman. She is 19 years of age and claims she received the consent of her parents to wed Ketchel and made preparations for the wedding which she believed would follow his avowal.

Just Winter-Time Talk.
CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—By U. P.—"It's all pleasant winter-time talk," declared President Charles Murphy, of the Chicago National league baseball club today, commenting on the report that Frank Chance, the great player-manager of the "Cubs," might forsake his team. "Frank Chance makes more than \$25,000 a year with Chicago. His earnings have probably been larger than those of any other man-

ager in baseball. He wrote his own contract last September, and it runs for four years."

PIONEER OREGONIAN DEAD.
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—By U. P.—William James Van Schuyver, one of Portland's most prominent citizens, died at his residence yesterday. He was taken ill Christmas.

For 43 years Mr. Van Schuyver has been a resident of Oregon. He was born in Port Wayne in 1854. Mr. Van Schuyver served his apprenticeship in the liquor business under Hugh McCullough, who was secretary of the treasury under the administration of President Johnson.

PIONEER PHYSICIAN DEAD.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 8.—Dr. John B. Smith, aged 65 years, mayor of this city from 1881 to 1888, organizer of the First cavalry in Oregon and for years the only physician in this city, died this morning after a few days' illness. He is survived by a widow, three daughters and three sons.
