

SUPREME COURT BLOCKED BY LOCAL OPTION BILL

OLYMPIA, Feb. 18.—By U. P.—Local option blocked the Washington state supreme court Wednesday.

The court is so overworked that two additional judges are asked for to enable the bench to handle the business, but the court adjourned Wednesday afternoon, while the big talkfest was going on in the senate over the local option bill.

The adjournment was not, however, to give the judges a chance to hear the arguments of the champions of the wet and dry.

In fact during the hours of recess the members of the court went into the little cubby holes which are flattered by being known as private chambers and there busied themselves poring over briefs and working on forthcoming decisions.

Just the same the recess was unusual and was further due to the local option bill.

On the court calendar there was a case set for argument which the entire bench desired presented fully. It was a bonding case from Spokane, August line against the Aetna Indemnity company, to recover on a bond given in connection with the construction of the court house at Wallace, Idaho.

The case came here for argument about eight months ago, but the judges then could not agree on a decision, so asked that the case be reargued.

Senator Will Graves is one of the attorneys and he was presiding at the senate session. So the court took a recess until the senate got through work, when it met again and listened to Graves.

Rarely will the court grant such a courtesy to any attorney, but in this case it was deemed good policy to do so.

BARTENDERS WILL LOSE ONE GRAFT

OLYMPIA, Feb. 18.—Bartenders who induce drunken men to draw checks will lose their graft if a bill introduced in the house by Sayre of Pierce becomes a law.

Incidentally the proposed law will probably keep down the penitentiary population about one-third, not to speak of the good it will do in saving the disgrace of convict stripes to many a poor, unfortunate victim of drink.

Walter McCallum, state clerk at the penitentiary, is the father of the bill, and he has compiled data from the prison records to show that the law is absolutely needed.

Investigation shows that in a majority of cases of forgery the defendant was drunk when he passed the paper, that he had it cashed in a saloon and spent the proceeds over the bar.

Sayre's bill provides that no check can be cashed by any saloonkeeper in any saloon. The penalty runs up to a maximum fine of \$500 and six months imprisonment.

THIS JUDGE FINDS OUT WHY

Women who think they can secure a divorce from Superior Judge A. W. Frazer by alleging their husbands will sue them, are doomed to disappointment. Late Judge Frazer, instead of granting decrees of divorce in such cases, has caused to be issued warrants for the arrest of husbands who will not support their wives.

Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Violet Collingwood, wife of Judge Frazer, to secure a divorce from her husband, John Collingwood. Apparently the judge believed her story as she told of how her husband had deserted and failed to support her, and when all was told and she expected to hear the words of separation pronounced, there came this bit:

Judgment on the case was continued for 40 days, and the prosecuting attorney's office was instructed to issue a warrant for the husband's arrest.

Los Angeles—"Billy Possum" adorns the insignia of the Los Angeles Boosters club today and has inspired the members to plan a novel "general boost."

Galveston, Tex.—Conductors of the New Orleans to San Francisco branch of the Southern Pacific railroad halted until early today without arriving at a decision as to whether their union shall strike the company because of the discharge of a fellow employee.

Washington—Members of the California delegation to congress today are in a puzzling situation as the result of a recent denunciation by the National League of California for a reduction of the duties on beet sugar and tin plate, which both can be produced cheaper in the United States than in any other nation.

Portland, Ore.—Portlanders are looking forward to a heart-to-heart talk with "Fighting Bob" Evans when he comes here on his lecture tour of the Pacific states.

New York—Seven Chinese are in the custody of the immigration inspectors at Morristown today, where the sheriff is awaiting word from Assistant U. S. Attorney General Fields. The Chinese were discovered half starved and nearly frozen to death in a boxcar, which had come from Canada under seal and labeled "merchandise."

St. Petersburg—Reports are current of the arrest of several men of noble blood and high official position, in connection with the revelations which followed the exposure of the noted terrorist leader, Eugene Axel, as a police spy.
