of Seattle's best talent.


PRESIDENT'S NEPHEW IS LAID TO REST

Relief Comes Twenty-Four Hours After Accident Occurs—Coroner Will De- termine Responsibility for Deaths.

"The conduct and management of the whole North

Trunk sewer had at last been
reached and rescued, two women
stood at the cage of the tunnel,
dry-eyed and staring, trying to
realize that under the mass of earth
at their feet lay the husband of
one and the son of the other.

WELL PROVIDED FOR.

Meanwhile, those living and re-
scued this morning were far from
being as badly off as one might
think. The timbering in the pocket
in which they were confined re-
mained staunch. They had electric
lights, cigars, food, water, and yester-
day afternoon they were reading
a copy of The Star's first ac-
count of their predicament almost
before the paper was on the street.
