

# HOT WEATHER NOT ABATING IN THE EAST

### Babies Dying by the Score in Washington—Many Cities Sweltering in Heat—Death List Grows.

(By United Press.)  
WASHINGTON, June 29.—Twenty-seven babies have died in Washington within the past six days as the result of heat and poverty, according to announcement made by the coroner. No relief from the hot weather is indicated today. The death list will probably be greatly increased by tomorrow.

Hundred in the Shade.  
TULSA, Okla., June 29.—The thermometer registered 100 in the shade here today and reports from various parts of the state tell of a similar condition.

Prostrations at St. Louis.  
ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 29.—There have been 17 deaths in the city hospital in the past three days as the result of intense heat, which shows no signs of abatement. Scores of prostrations were reported today and many more deaths are expected.

Cooler at Chicago.  
CHICAGO, June 29.—Relief from the oppressive heat which has been responsible for many deaths in the last few days came today with cooler breezes from Lake Michigan.

## "WE WANT TO LIVE HONESTLY AND PAY OUR OBLIGATIONS"

### THIS IS THE BURDEN OF A PLEA MADE BY CITY EMPLOYEES.

"Help us to live honestly by paying us more wages" was an earnest plea made by laboring men employed by the city, through a petition handed in to the city council last night. The petition was referred to the civil service commission and the committee on salaries.

City laborers are now making \$2.50 per day and they ask for a raise of about 50 cents. It is stated in the petition that when men have a family of from eight to ten children it is hard and often impossible to make both ends meet.

"We simply ask what is right in the sight of God and of all men," continued the petition. "Could any one of you at the present time make a living at \$2.50 a day, and support a family of eight or ten children? Take this to yourselves and please don't forget that it all helps us to live honestly and pay our debts. Nothing is lost that will enable us to pay our grocer and butcher again. Please don't lay this aside and forget it, but see to it that we get it."

It is planned by Mr. Stine to form classes and instruct the children in outdoor sports. Supervisors are to be in charge of the different playfields.


