It will require \$2,000 to provide a house and lot, and Mrs. Cooke says she feels confident that she can secure this amount. The benefit last Friday afternoon netted close to \$1,000, and the remainder Mrs. Cooke will raise by various means. At the death of her mother Miss Bromley made an attempt to keep the family, which numbered eight, together under one roof. Death claimed two of the little ones and the sickness of two others broke the spirit of the plucky young woman. Her trouble appealed to the hearts of many and every effort was made for her has met with hearty approval. Mrs. Cooke started the fund and she says when she can put the small family in a tiny house of their own then she will feel that she has done something that will be worth while. Even then the support of the five surviving children will be upon Mrs. Bromley's shoulders. A pretty big load for a man to carry and so much heavier for the girl who is just past 20. Every assistance should be given Mrs. Cooke in her work, for the cause is certainly worthy.

HACKS WIFE TO DEATH NOTIFIES THE POLICE THEN TAKES OWN LIFE

Beautiful Woman Is Killed; Then Slayer Hides Body, Writes Confession and Takes It to Police.

(By United Press.) NEW BEDFORD, Mass., July 26. Killing his wife and hacking her body to pieces with a tomahawk, Robert E. Fanning, a wealthy resident of Westport, cast the mutilated corpse into the bushes beside a lonely road, returned to his home and wrote a sensational letter, sped in his automobile to the police station here, delivered the written confession of his crime to an officer, and blew off the top of his head with a revolver shot. Drink is believed to have been responsible for the horrible tragedy. Half crazed from a prolonged debauch, Fanning hid near Lyons brook last night. He selected a spot which he knew his beautiful wife would pass on her way home from a neighbor's home, where she had been visiting. The woman, unsuspecting the terrible fate which awaited her, walked into the ambush and was felled with a blow from the tomahawk. Mad with blood lust, the crazed man hacked at her prostrate body until it was mutilated almost beyond recognition. Then, hiding the evidence of his crime in the bushes near the roadway, he returned to his home at Westport. Writes the Letter. Fanning spent the remainder of the night in composing a sensational letter to the police. Early today he got into his automobile and came to New Bedford. Meeting friends and acquaintances, Fanning chatted gaily with them, and none suspected that anything was wrong. He took his machine to a garage and left detailed instructions regarding its care. After attending to several business matters of minor importance, the man walked to the police station, where he asked to see the

BOOZE CAUSE OF ANOTHER MURDER HERE

Booze caused another murder and suicide when Bart Rumsey sent two bullets crashing through the brain of his wife and then turned the weapon on himself in a room at the Illinois lodging house, at First av. and Bell st., Saturday afternoon. Three years ago Rumsey and his wife were a happy couple. A son 14 years old and two younger daughters blessed their home. And then for some reason wife and husband began to drink. The home was broken up and the Rumseys began to live the down grade life. Two months ago the pair came to Seattle. A few days after their arrival Mrs. Rumsey disappeared with \$300 belonging to her husband. Rumsey reported the disappearance to the police and then left the city in search of his runaway spouse. While Rumsey was away his wife returned to Seattle and took a room at the Illinois house, three weeks ago. And then Rumsey returned. He learned the whereabouts of his wife. Wife and husband held several stormy conferences, and Saturday afternoon Rumsey, fortified by booze, murdered his wife and then ended his own life. Deputy Coroner William Borthwick learned that the Rumseys were married 15 years ago at Butte. The murderer's mother lives at Portland, but at present is visiting in the east. His father died several years ago. Franklin Stevens, a portion of whose effects were found in Mrs. Rumsey's room, has not been seen since the shooting. The bodies will be held at the undertaking establishment pending a search for Rumsey's mother.

MAN DRUNK 80 DAYS THEN TAKES HIS LIFE

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—Just 81 days ago Charles Walker, a ship carpenter, showed his wife, Mrs. F. C. Saralza, a bank book indicating a \$1,600 deposit, and said: "When that is gone I'll go too. It will last me 80 days." Yesterday his dead body was found in his bedroom, where it had lain since Saturday, when Mrs. Saralza heard the sound of a shot, but failed to investigate. When the bank book was exhibited, Walker was sober and industrious. Mrs. Saralza said, and the woman thought he was joking when he added: "Twenty dollars a day will keep me drunk till the 80 days are ended."

Could Not Kill Baby

"I would like for my baby to join us, but, cruel as I am, I have not the heart for such. "My wife's body lies on the west side of Lyons brook, about 50 feet south, in the bushes. Please give it immediate attention and remove the same as soon as possible. "When Fanning ended his life a squad of police was dispatched to the scene of last night's tragedy, and found his wife's body where he had said he had hid it.

CATCH BOLD BAD BURGLAR

CHARLES ADGER NABBED JUST AFTER LOOTING A RESIDENCE.

Armed with two revolvers, Charles Adger, a burglar, was captured yesterday afternoon just as he had looted the residence of H. T. Broder, at 1804 15th av. A set of amethyst beads, a coral necklace, a gold filigree, a gold chain with a diamond set locket and several other articles of jewelry taken from the Broder home were found on the prisoner. When searched at police headquarters an electric flash lantern and a large Jimmy were found concealed in his clothing. Several cooked opium pills were also taken from Adger. When taken before Captain of Detectives Tennant the thief tried stealthily to gain possession of the package of "yen shoe," but was prevented. "It's my first job, Cap," Adger pleaded. "All you thieves say that," replied Tennant. "Now, you tell me where your room is or I'll tear your head off with this jimmy." Adger lost no time in giving the information. The detectives went to room 59, Eryll hotel, at Eighth st. and Pike st., last night, and found several pieces of old jewelry, a revolver and a "hop layout" in the prisoner's room. Adger is 23 years old and says he is a waiter. The arrest was made by Detectives Hayden and Passolt and Sergeant Nash.

PAYING OFF A.-Y.-P. DEBT

SUCCESS OF THE FAIR SHOWN IN PAYMENTS BEING MADE. Depositing each day 50 per cent of the gate receipts with the Washington Trust company of this city, the A.-Y.-P. exposition will early this week be ready to declare the third payment on its bonded indebtedness of \$250,000. Two payments of 10 per cent each have already been made, and as rapidly as the sinking fund accumulates the necessary \$25,000, new payments will be declared. GIRL DROWNED IN BAY

Flynn, on the east side of Commencement bay, Miss Margaret Clara Cuvreen, a girl 17 years of age, was drowned when the skiff capsized. Flynn was able to swim and after trying in vain to rescue the young woman, reached the shore and was saved.

TROLLEY CARS CRASH
