UNCLE JOE CANNON NOW WEARS A DENTED CROWN

HIS HIGH TARIFF DEEDS HAVE SEALED HIS DOOM, SO SAY HIS FRIENDS.

(By United Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 2.—The present tariff bill has sealed the fate of Speaker Cannon. It is the last of his term of speaker-ship.

This announcement comes from the former friends of the veteran statesman of Danville, Ill. It is not the threat of Victor Murdock's band of insurgents. It is the talk of prominent and hitherto influential members of the Cannon organization—mostly members from the Middle West.

Got 'Em Into Mess.

"Cannon got us into this mess," is what they say. "We never intended to revise the tariff upward. See what Cannon did with the conference committee. We were in favor of the lower duties of the house bill. That darned old rascal of a speaker packed the conference committee against lower duties and against Sen. Payne, who favored lower duties. He put Fordney, of Michigan, and Calderhead, of Kansas, on instead of men like McCall, who came next in order of seniority. He is responsible for the stubborn fight in conference for the duties of the Aldrich bill. He is responsible, in fact, for all revision upward. He betrayed the republican members of the house. He no longer deserves the members' confidence."

Cannon Will be Cursed.

And they will talk this way for an hour; and in a few weeks they will be back in their districts cursing Cannon in all the fervid terms learned from Cannon's lips.

Which means that Cannon has been elected to be "goat."

By sacrificing Cannon, it is hoped by republican members of the Middle West that they may still save the republican majority of the house. Something they know has got to break. Somebody has got to suffer the consequences of revision upward. For quite a while the prospect has been improving for a dem-

ocratic majority in the house. At such rate has this improvement gone on that now it is recognized even by the republicans as a moral certainty—unless something busts."

Chosen as Jonah.

Cannon is the first thing to be hurled into the breach. To change the metaphor, he is chosen as the Jonah and is to be heaved overboard. His colleagues in the house—many of them his good political friends in the past and recipients of favors at his hands—are alarmed at the winds of popular sentiment which are shrieking through the halls and at the heavy laboring of the political ship, and they are convinced that it is time to throw something or somebody overboard.

"Cannonism" has been a burden on the party for some time now. This fact was recognized by Taft and Roosevelt during the last campaign. Hitchcock was alive to the fact also.

He's a Heavy Burden.

"Cannonism is the heaviest burden which we are compelled to carry," said Taft, in speaking to a friend in Cincinnati last September. Even during the presidential campaign a number of members of congress, particularly in the Middle West, were obliged to unload the weight of "Cannonism" before they could make their congressional race. Several came to this congress pledged to vote against Cannon and the rules. Some kept this pledge and some did not.

Unfortunately for the members, the load of "Cannonism" is not so easy to be thrown overboard. Cannon has been chosen speaker of the sixty-first congress. This is merely the special session of that congress. Next December begins the regular session and the following winter will see the final session of this congress, ending March 4, 1911. At all these sessions Jos. G. Cannon, of Danville, Ill., will preside.

Payne is Cannon's Follower.

Just at present Sen. Payne, of New York, is boomed as the successor to Cannon. This is because Payne has stood for the comparatively lower duties of the house bill

in the wrangles of the conference. The republican members seem to think that anything which is a bit the better than the Aldrich bill is enough to make its sponsor a popular hero. In view of the fact that the Payne bill is an upward revision from the Dingley law it will be some time before Sen. Payne can be ranked as a revision downward or a progressive republican. But the friends of Cannon see fit to boom him now for Cannon's job.

Meantime the democrats are getting ready to elect Champ Clark as the next speaker. And all the time Victor Murdock smiles.


