

BIG PRIZES OFFERED FOR LIVE STOCK

Exposition Show Will Bring the Best the Country Has to Offer to Seattle.

Sixty thousand dollars in prizes, the greatest list of awards ever prepared in the west, will be presented to the winners in the A-Y-P. exposition live stock show, which will be held the last 10 days of this month. Work has been started at the south end of the fair grounds on the three acres of buildings needed for the big show, which will bring the biggest attendance of the season from the country districts of the Northwest. More than 2,000 head of the finest stock in the world are entered in the horse and cattle branches. Sheep, swine and poultry will be equally well represented by all the live stock circuits and exhibitors from the Canadian circuit will drop down here, those of the middle west will come after the Minnesota State fair, and the southern exhibitors will find Seattle ready for them at the end of the California shows.

TAXPAYER TIES UP SALARIES OF CLERKS

That for many years the county has illegally paid salaries to clerks and bailiffs in county justice courts is the contention of W. P. McElwain, a taxpayer, who yesterday was granted an order by Judge John F. Main restraining the county commissioners and County Auditor Otto A. Case from paying this class of employees for their services. As the order is not returnable until September 10, the salaries will be tied up until that date, at least. The clerks and bailiffs of Seattle are also affected by the order. McElwain uses the argument that the law gives the commissioners no authority to employ these men.

WENATCHEE FOLK TO OBSERVE THEIR DAY AT FAIR TOMORROW

CITY OF APPLES PREPARES CELEBRATION—WILL GIVE AWAY FRUIT.

You'll do better in Wenatchee. The home of the Big Red Apple. Where dollars grow on trees.

Tomorrow is Wenatchee day at the fair, and these are the slogans of the occasion, when the apple city will celebrate at the A-Y-P. its premiership over all appleland. Mike Horan, first prize winner at the National Apple show last year, will be apple king of the day. A military band will come with the visitors and they will parade the downtown streets tomorrow morning, reach the fair at 12:30, listen to speeches by President Chilberg, Judge Burke and Dr. W. A. Stevenson, of Wenatchee, at the Washington State building at 2 o'clock, and for the rest of the day distribute fruit and watermelons gratis, on the steps of the Auditorium, while the Wenatchee Military band gives a concert. The band will play again at 8 o'clock, in Nome circle. Two or three thousand Wenatchee people will come to Seattle tonight by special train to celebrate the day. Dr. D. W. King is chairman of the occasion.

A recital, highly appreciated by the 2,000 Seattle music lovers who attended it, was given in the new Armory last night, when H. Evan Williams, the tenor, assisted by Miss Hazel Barnes, leading contralto of the Mormon Tabernacle choir, sang several selections. Williams responded to an encore and sang selections that were not on the program. His rendition of "Love and a Rose" was especially appreciated. Miss Barnes was recalled to the platform after her rendition of "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice" and sang "My Ain Folk," a Scotch ballad.

MANY CELEBRITIES WILL ATTEND BIG BARBECUE AT OXBOW

CELEBRATION OF WATERWAY BILL PASSAGE WILL BE ATTENDED BY 5,000.

That the barbecue to be held at Oxbow Saturday afternoon to celebrate the passage of the waterway bill will be attended by many officials is shown by the acceptances received by James Wilson, secretary of the Duwamish River Improvement club, to the invitations sent out by the club.

Many of the state officials, from Governor Hay down, are expected to attend, in addition to members of the legislature from Western Washington. Mayor Miller, H. Gill, Eugene W. Way and other councilmen will attend, together with officials from Tacoma, Georgetown and Renton. A number of these officials will follow Senator Piles and State Senator Cotterill on the speakers' platform, much of the time of the afternoon being given to speaking. A general invitation to the public to attend is extended by the club.

Frye, Bruhn & Co. has donated another ox for the barbecue, in addition to that donated by the McLaughlin Realty company. Three oxen and a number of sheep will be roasted and bread and other accessories will be supplied to feed from 3,000 to 5,000 people. The barbecue will probably be largely attended both by farmers of the Duwamish and White River valleys and by Seattle people.

300,000 PERSONS USED DEPOT LAST MONTH

During the month of August 309,095 people arrived and departed from the city through the King st. station, which is the terminal for the Northern Pacific and Great Northern only. This is nearly the entire population of the city, and was handled within one month. Also during the month of August the statistician's record shows that the Northern Pacific handled 214,454 of this amount and the Great Northern 94,641.
