PLAIN CAROMS

An illustration of the control of the cue ball by application of different forces and being struck one quarter below the center, the object ball struck three-quarters right of center, is shown here.



The four object balls show from left to right the effect of a medium, ordinary, hard and very hard stroke. Practice is necessary to properly gauge the strength. The force of the stroke controls the carom. When like positions are brought about in a game, the player will recognize the similarity and play the shot accordingly, if he practices the shots here shown.

LAYING FOR WASHINGTON

DOBIE WILL HAVE HIS TROUBLES BUILDING UP ANOTHER CHAMP TEAM.

Football prospects at the University have taken on a rozier hue since Captain Muckelstone has appeared on the field. The first of the practice games, the Captain was conspicuous by his absence and the rumor went around that "trig" or physics had tackled him in mid field.

The real reason, however, turned out to be that he had some difficulty in arranging his work so as to be free at practice time.

The back field is worrying Coach Dobie. Only "Wee" Coyle and the captain of last year's back field are left for a nucleus. Freshman material will have to fill the hole, and there is promise in some of the first-year recruits.

The line will be materially strengthened next week by the arrival in college of Royal Pullen from Alaska. Pullen was a member of the famous Seattle High School, United States champion team in 1901, and is a brother of Dan Pullen, the West Point captain for this year.

According to the coaches who have seen both of the brothers play, Royal will be as good as Dan after a year's training.

Ben Ohnisk, the Japanese boy, who made the high school football circles sit up and take notice last year when he was a member of Lincoln High School team, is out for end, but will have to show more class than he has so far if he intends to win out.

There are several holes left in the line by the graduation of Bantz, Jarvis and Babcock, but they should not be hard to fill.

All the colleges in the Pacific Northwest are out for Washington's scalp this season and it will take a good bunch to hold the championship that was won last fall.

GOOD CARD ARRANGED FOR SMOKER TONIGHT


