PLEASE TELL ME WOMEN'S QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY CYNTHIA GREY

Dear Miss Grey: Who would one go to, if desirous of going on the Nashville stage? I have had but little experience.

AN AMATEUR. A—it is impossible to give advice in this column.

Dear Miss Grey: (1) How do you cure pimples? (2) How do you take the swelling out of your legs? (3) Is it possible to make a nose smaller? DICK.

A—Pimples are usually caused by some organic trouble, and you should consult a physician who will be able to prescribe medicine of advice as to proper diet, etc., to be followed. You should at once ascertain if the swelling of the eyelids is caused by kidney trouble, or some other organic disturbance, and take your medicine and treatment. If the swelling is caused from insufficient sleep, or from eye strain, rest and frequent bathing in salt and water or boracic acid will be found soothing. It is not possible to materially change the size or shape of the nose. Correct massage may possibly lessen the size, but people usually have to be content with the beauty bestowed on them at birth.

Dear Miss Grey: Will you kindly give me some information in regard to the following?

(1) What will cure a corn? (2) How can I take wrinkles out of my forehead? I am only 18 years old and my forehead is somewhat wrinkled. (3) What will make my hands, face and neck white and my cheeks red? My skin is kind of yellow. (4) What will make my eyebrows thick and eyelashes long? (5) How can I have a large bust? (6) Is cod liver oil good to make people fat? I am very thin and want to be fat and have plump arms and neck if possible.

GAY PAREE. A—1. The easiest way to get rid of a corn is to consult a reliable chiropodist who can remove the corn and tell you how to avoid its return. 2. Avoid frowning. You probably have a habit of frowning, which will cause wrinkles, and as you consider the wrinkles in the forehead will get deeper and harder to remove. Massage across the middle, using a good cold cream, but never in the direction of the lines. 3. You say your skin is yellow. Your general health evidently is poor and your liver not properly performing its functions. Plenty of outdoor exercise and proper diet will aid in clearing your skin and put a healthy color in your cheeks. 4. Anoint eyebrows and lashes with vasoline, being careful not to get any into the eye proper. This will stop the cause of the eyebrows and eyelashes growing thicker and longer. 5. Cod liver oil is fattening, but only an amount that can be assimilated by the system need be taken. Exercise, gentle callisthenics and massage will help in developing the bust, neck and arms.

THE WORK THAT NEVER DONE

In the case of such foods as butter and milk, this precaution is of double importance, because there is a greater danger of food contamination owing to their absorbent properties. Flour is also highly absorbent and should not come in close contact with other foods. When flour is bought by the barrel, elevate the barrel so that there may be a free current of air beneath it, to ward off the danger of the flour on the bottom of the barrel becoming musty. Keep roasted coffee in tin or glass and tightly covered. When exposed to the air or kept too long it loses both aroma and strength. For these reasons it should be bought in limited quantities. On the other hand, green coffee improves with age. Store salt in a stone jar in a dry place. When desirable to keep butter any length of time, wrap each roll in clean muslin, then pack in brine that will float an egg, and weight down with a heavy plate. Cover the top of the jar closely. Lard should be kept in bright tin pails or tins. Soda and baking powder should be kept in the original packages, and kept in a cool, dry place. Soap should be purchased in quantities, unwrapped and stacked on a shelf to harden. When well dried out, its lasting qualities are about double.

MOTHER'S PROBLEMS

If your child should swallow a hard substance which menaces the safety of the stomach and intestines, or which sticks in the throat, causing partial suffocation, instantly cram into the sufferer's mouth as much of the crumb of soft bread as the mouth will hold, and keep on stuffing it and urging the child to swallow "hard" until the obstacle is removed. Mashed potato is excellent, also. The vascid pulp of the bread and the potato mush "encyst" the sharp substance and carry it through the alimentary canal without causing irritation. This homely device has saved many lives. Every mother should know of and recollect it.

FROM MARY'S COOK BOOK



That too much meat is eaten during the summer all doctors agree. Whether cold meat is worse than hot meat is a mooted point. But cold meat is palatable to many people and to the woman who is her own cook it is a blessing. Try these three simple, new recipes, and I am sure you will feel repaid. They are delicious and inexpensive.

Chicken Galatine. Boil a three-pound chicken until very tender, skin and bone it and chop rather fine. Pack it in a buttered pan in alternate layers of dark and light. Boil the broth down to one quart, add one-fourth teaspoon salt and paprika, dash celery salt, one teaspoon lemon juice, and one tablespoon granulated gelatine which has been dissolved. When it begins to set, pour over the chopped chicken. When firm and cool, set on ice until ready to serve, then slice, and garnish with parsley.

Veal Jelly. Boil three pounds of veal with one teaspoon chopped onion, one tablespoon celery seed, one teaspoon minced parsley, one teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon cloves, dash cayenne and one-half teaspoon kitchen bouquet. Remove when cooked tender, chop fine, return bone to kettle and boil until liquor is reduced to one pint. Line mold with hard boiled eggs cut in slices, pour in an inch of stock, mix remainder with chopped meat, fill mold, and when cool, place on ice. Serve in loaf on bed of cream, and slice at table. Very pretty.

Pressed Beef. Simmer three pounds round of beef in two quarts of water and one teaspoon salt until tender and cool in liquor. When cold remove bones and fat and chop fine. Boil liquor until reduced to two cups, add two tablespoons vinegar, one teaspoon mixed spices, one-fourth teaspoon paprika, juice and grated rind of one lemon, mix one cupful with meat thoroughly, press in buttered mold, pour remainder of liquor over.

Vanilla Ice Cream. Three pints of milk, a can of condensed milk, 2 or 3 eggs, sugar and vanilla flavoring to taste, then freeze. Do not cook. Make coffee ice cream by leaving out the vanilla and adding strong coffee to taste.
