ITALIAN SMASHED TWO WORLD RECORDS OF LONG YEARS' STANDING.

What do you know about this Emilio Lunghi person, who came over here from Italy, trained on a diet of spaghetti and chili and romped off with two records that have stood for years?

He grabbed the half-mile championship of the United States, cutting three-fifths of a second off the record, made by Kilpatrick 14 years ago. Then what did Emilio do but jump on the two-thirds of a mile record, which had stood since 1882, with both feet, and on Oct. 2 chop almost three seconds off the time, made by W. G. George back in '82?

Fretty tough to see Kilpatrick's records of years ago smashed by everlasting smithereens and by "one of them foreigners," as Martin Sheridan puts it. But as "Kil" was the first to congratulate Emilio, etc., about all the rest of us can do is to come in.

JEFF WILL BID ON OWN FIGHT

Member of a Syndicate to Stage His Battle With Johnson at Point Richmond, California.

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—Jim Coffroth departed for New York yesterday morning prepared for the fight of his life for the Jeffries-Johnson match, and opposed to Coffroth as a bidder, it was learned, will be none other than Jeffries himself. Associated with Jeffries will be Jack Gleason of the San Francisco Baseball club and Sam Berger.

Some time ago it was announced that a representative of a syndicate had approached Gleason with a proposition to go after the match and build a great arena near Point Richmond, Cal. Gleason was to be the general manager of the job, and the other fellows were to put up the money.

Berger and Gleason corresponded with Jeffries, giving him a general outline. The big fellow now is said to have fallen in with the game immediately when he was assured that he would be one of the partners in the enterprise.

Then Berger began to work on Johnson. The black was told of the scheme and a definite offer is said to have been made him. What this offer was is not stated, but inasmuch as Berger has frequently declared that he had "received two bona fide offers of \$75,000," it is reasonable to assume that this was the figure set before Johnson.

One of the offers, and Berger said he had absolute knowledge that it was bona fide, in all probability is the offer of the syndicate in which he, Gleason and Jeffries hope to be interested if they can win Johnson over.

"But I believe I can convince them and Jeffries that it will not be necessary to build an arena, mine down in San Mateo county being entirely ample."

LAWYER AFTER "LIL ARTHUR"

(By United Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—Jack Johnson, black heavyweight champion, was the principal figure in an exciting chase through the streets here yesterday, when in his large automobile he tried to evade two deputy sheriffs who were seeking to attach his car.

Johnson owed Attorney Carroll Cook \$100 for legal services. He would not pay, so Cook secured an attachment on the negro's automobile. The machine was in a garage for repairs. Cook anticipated that the pugilist would ignore the attachment, and so had the two deputy sheriffs stationed with a second automobile near the garage with authority to take the machine or collect the debt.

Johnson appeared with five dusky blacks and a negro attorney. When he heard of the attachment he consigned it to the infernal regions, and jumped into the machine, closely followed by his dusky retinue.

The deputies quickly gave chase, and at length overtook the fleeing pugilist. The negro then paid the debt, and was allowed to motor on his way.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—Now that Champion Jack Johnson has put the quietus on Stanley Ketchel so far as his heavyweight aspirations are concerned, fight fans the country over are clamoring for a match between the Michigan lion and "Beggars" Sam Langford, the Boston demon.

It is pointed out that Langford and Ketchel are the two best men now fighting in the middleweight division, and that a battle to settle the supremacy of the two would attract thousands of fight followers, and net the promoter staging the set-to a tidy penny.

Although these men have been matched, they have never gotten together. When they were scheduled to go 10 rounds several weeks ago before the Fairmont Athletic club of New York, Governor Hughes took a hand in the matter and instructed District Attorney Jerome to stop the fight. This proved a great disappointment to the New York fans, as both Langford and Ketchel are fighters of the whirlwind variety, and when either of them gets into the ring the fans can always count on a run for their money. In size and weight the negro and the white man are evenly matched, although Ketchel is said to have a stiffer punch than the Boston negro.

It is very probable that when Promoter Jim Coffroth arrives in New York to stage the Johnson-Ketchel fight pictures he will see Langford and try to arrange for a finish fight between the negro and Ketchel for his Colma arena.

As Langford says that he would like nothing better than to get Stanley in the stage, the Johnson-Ketchel fight is "crazy to get a crack" at "Beggars" Sam, the fans think Coffroth should experience little difficulty in staging the battle.
