

FAMILY SENT TO DEATH IN ORDER TO ROB

Unknown Man Kills Three and Then Makes Escape After Stealing Big Sum of Money and Jewelry.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 21.—Three persons were murdered by an unidentified man near Kansas City, Kan., late yesterday.
 Alonzo Van Royer, his wife and a sister-in-law, Miss Rose McMahon, were the victims. The women were found dead in the kitchen of their house, where they had been working. The police suspected the husband of the crime and began a search for him. Late last night his body was found 300 yards from the house, covered with leaves. He had been shot through the head. Mrs. Van Royer was shot three times and her sister six times.
 Five hundred dollars in cash and a diamond ring that had been kept in a trunk in the Van Royer residence were missing.
 Van Royer is said to have been seen with a stranger Tuesday. They were drinking. The police believe the man learned that he had money at home and, accompanying him to his residence, committed the murders.
 Sheriff Becker, of Wyandotte county, Kansas, is heading a posse in search of the murderer.

NOTED JAPANESE HAVE PASSED TO THE BEYOND

TOKIO, Oct. 21.—Marquis Saga, the oldest attendant in the service of the emperor, died here yesterday, aged 94 years. Marquis Saga has served continuously in the Japanese court for 85 years, during which time three emperors have reigned.

TOKIO, Oct. 21.—Viscount General Ogawa, one of the best known military figures in Japan and famed for his knowledge of strategy, died at his home here yesterday, following a long illness, as a result of a wound he received in the battle of Liao-Yang during the Japanese-Russian war. He was 61 years old.

TORONTO, Canada, Oct. 21.—Did you ever spend Sunday in Toronto? If you haven't, don't.

Take my tip on it, and don't. You can get to Buffalo between 9 o'clock and noon, and it's a good idea to do it. Buffalo isn't the best town in the world, but—

Well, Goldsmith's "Deserted Village" is like 42d and Broadway in comparison to Toronto on Sunday. I spent two days in Montreal and one Sunday in Toronto. There's a startling difference. Like—well, say, like between day and night.

Montreal is a wide open town. You can laugh and smoke and talk French and sing and drink Scotch whiskey at mahogany bars, and get into a limit game most any hour of the day or night, seven days a week, there.

Rut, Toronto—

Well, I came into the town early in the morning—Sunday morning. There's a hotel alongside the depot, but I figure I'll go farther uptown, and see a little of the city on the way. I take a car and ride for blocks through the business section of the city. Everything is closed up. Ticket's in the proverbial drum.

Banks are closed, of course, and wholesale groceries—you'd expect that. But so are restaurants and drug stores and news stands and souvenir postal card emporiums—everything.

"Restaurants?" the conductor echoes. "Well, if you get off at the second block ahead, and walk four blocks to the right, and round the corner to the north a little way, there's a place that's usually open."

WANT TWO BANNY DID TO YAQUIS

TURNER FIRES HIS SECOND SHOT AT DIAZ AND BARBAROUS MEXICO.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—John Kenneth Turner's second article on "Barbarous Mexico," which will appear tomorrow in the American Magazine, declares that the Yaqui Indians, generally supposed to have been marauders and murderers, originally were the best workers in Mexico, and would have been a sturdy and thrifty people had not the Mexican officials driven them to war through plots to dispossess them of rich lands in southern Sonora. The article will say that they were taken "prisoners of war" and sold into slavery at \$65 each.

Among other things in his article Turner says: "For 24 years the only governors of Sonora have been Ramon Corral, who is now vice president of Mexico, Rafael Yaezel and Luis Torres. These men have rotated in office, and the people of Sonora had no choice in their selection."

The article says: "The officials saw a great opportunity for graft in bringing soldiers into the state, who continually harassed the Yaquis. Bogus surveys were sent through the Yaqui valley to mark the lands. Eighty thousand dollars belonging to Chief Cajame were illegally confiscated from him. When the chief complained, armed men were sent to bring about his arrest. They could not find the chief, so they burned Cajame's house, the homes of his neighbors, and assaulted the women."

"Since that day, 24 years ago, Mexico has kept an army of from 2,400 to 6,000 men in the field against the Yaquis. Thousands of soldiers and tens of thousands of Yaquis have been killed."

EARTHQUAKE REGISTERED.

COLORED GIRL WHO LOVES, RUNS AWAY AND LANDS IN JAIL

The verity of the old adage, "The course of true love never runs smoothly," was forcibly proven this morning in Judge Mitchell Gilliam's department of the superior court, when Effie Walker, a pretty mulatto girl of 17 years, was denied habeas corpus papers, and as a result will have to remain confined in the county jail.

The girl had run away from her home in Muskogee, Indian Territory, coming to Seattle, where she met her dusky lover.

By the wily father of the girl, who was in Kansas City, had the chief of police in that city, Chief Ward here, and the Walker girl was arrested in the southern part of the city last Sunday.

She has been kept in the matron's ward of the jail, awaiting the arrival of her father, who is on his way here.

The habeas corpus proceeding was the last desperate attempt of the girl's ardent admirer to secure her release before the arrival of her father. He knew that the arrival of father Walker and the subsequent return to the East will mean the temporary end of his romance. But the petition was denied, and Effie must return to jail and await there her angry parent.

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


