(2) When people went from New York by water 39 years ago, and did not go around Cape Horn, how did they cross the Isthmus of Panama, by rail or stage, to get to Oakland? "ANXIOUS."

A.—The first transcontinental route, via the Union Pacific and Central Pacific, was finished in 1869. It had been in construction for some years previous, but the Civil war and the crisis of 1857 had delayed its completion until that time.

(2) The Isthmus of Panama was crossed by people using that route to get to California 39 years ago, by stage and small boats on the navigable rivers.
