

## POLICEMAN'S WIDOW IS GIVEN RELIEF

The initial meeting of the trustees of the police relief and pension fund was held yesterday afternoon. The trustees voted \$1,000 for Mrs. Christine McDonald, wife of the late Capt. Alexander McDonald. The new state law requires the payment of \$1,000 to the widow or heirs of police officers who have been 10 years or more in the service. ## HAS RIGHT NAME, IS WRONG MAN, NOW IN TROUBLE

What's in a name? If that name is Geo. B. Cox, there may be several things in it, it appears, the familiar lines to the contrary notwithstanding. Lots belonging to delinquent taxes, appeared in the court records of King county. William E. Budlong, an abstractor, wrote to "Geo. B. Cox," offering to represent him in clearing up the title or to buy the lots if the owner desired to sell.  
"Geo. B. Cox" answered the letter in person, said he had come into the possession of the property by inheritance. Rather than "bother" with clearing up the title, he accepted an offer of \$200 from Budlong and the cash was paid. Budlong remarked, "Of course, the property is worth more than that and I'll expect to make something out of it." "I hope you'll make \$50,000," "Cox" replied.  
This is the substance of the story told in Justice Fred C. Brown's court yesterday afternoon in a preliminary hearing of Cox or a complaint of grand larceny. But there is more than one George B. Cox, it seems, and the Geo. B. Cox who owns these lots and inherited them from his mother, Anne Cox, is a New Hampshire man, and not the Geo. B. Cox who "sold" the property and appeared as the defendant in the trial yesterday.  
The Seattle Geo. B. Cox, or Geo. W. Cox, as his name may be, worked a game on Budlong, according to Deputy Prosecuting Attorney John E. Perry. "What's in a name?" was answered for him by Justice Brown in binding him over to the superior court in the sum of \$1,000.

## COUNCIL CAN MAKE CAR LINE SCHEDULES

The first attempt the city council has ever made to fix schedules on street car lines got a setback last night, when Mayor Miller's veto of Sparkman's ordinance, fixing the schedules on the West Queen Anne line, was read. The mayor said the ordinance fixed no penalty for failure of the Seattle Electric Co. to comply with its terms, and his veto was because of that. Sparkman immediately introduced a new ordinance carrying a penalty.  
If this second ordinance is passed and signed by the mayor it will fix a precedent for which A. V. Bouillon fought for months. Mr. Bouillon made an attempt to get the council to fix car line schedules, and the city council always refused, despite the popular clamor for better car service.


