

VOTING FOR DIRECTORS OF CITY SCHOOLS

Contest for Three Seats on School Board and on Bond Issue Is in Progress Today.

The election of three members to the board of education is taking place today between the hours of 1 and 8 p. m. A vote is also being taken upon the approval of a bond issue of \$500,000 and the exchange of a lot with the park board for a site for the Adams school.

The official ballot, prepared yesterday, under the direction of Secretary Reuben W. Jones, is as follows:

Three-year term—Frank M. Guion, Mrs. Peter Bettinger, Everett Smith, J. C. McFadden.
Two-year term—Edmund Bowden, D. J. Iton.
One-year term—William Pigott, F. X. Christmann.
