

NO ONE CAN GET MAJORITY FOR SENATE

J. E. CHILBERG.

Seattle Man Gives Interview at Washington on State Situation—Point-dexter Replies.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.—Jan E. Chilberg of Seattle has just spent some time at the capital, and during his stay gave to a reporter for a local newspaper an interview which has caused not a little discussion among those interested in the senatorial fight in the state of Washington.

"With three candidates residing in my country and two in other parts of the state," Mr. Chilberg is quoted as saying, "the contest for the seat now occupied by Senator Piles is exceptionally uncertain. If all these candidates go into the primary, it seems a sure thing that no one of them could receive a majority vote, and I doubt if the legislature of Washington would feel obligated to elect the man getting a plurality."

"I am inclined to believe that the members would be disposed to disregard the primary and go ahead and elect some man of their own choosing."

When the above was shown to Representative Miles Point-dexter he replied as follows:

"The suggestion that the legislature should ignore the mandate of the primary is one whose honesty of good faith can best be appraised by the voters of our state, but needless to say, it is the campaign by one of our party's chief supporters, it seems to me very much like a conspiracy of defeat."

"Speaking as one of the candidates for senator, I am glad to say that I shall abide by the verdict of the primary, and if any other candidate has in mind a contrary course of action, he will find before the fight is ended that his political future is already behind him."

"When a man says that his conscience requires him to make his restriction it may be taken as one that the law is about to require the same thing.—Charleston News and Courier."

AFTER 3 YEARS FAMOUS PASSION PLAY IS READY

MUNICH, March 18.—After three years preparation, the first dress rehearsal of the Passion Play, last produced in 1900, took place at Oberammergau today. Performances will continue at intervals until the end of September.

The play, as usual, begins with two tableaux, the first representing the expulsion of Adam and Eve from Eden, and the second the adoration of the cross. Then follow 18 scenes, beginning with Christ's entry into Jerusalem and concluding with the ascension.

In this year's rendition Anton Lang, the village potter, takes the part of Christ, as in 1900, Johann Zwink, who was Judas 10 years ago, also appears again in the same role. The part of John is taken by a plumber, Simon by a cooper, Thaddeus by a road cleaner, Andrew by a shoemaker, Annas, the high priest, by a parish beadle, and the Virgin Mary by Ottilie Zwink, daughter of the actor who plays Judas. In all, about 1,000 persons take part, in various capacities, in the play.



MUST HAVE NEW, EASILY WHITTLED WOOD FOR OUR LEAD PENCILS

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.—Recent conferences of representatives of the department of agriculture with several lead pencil manufacturers have resulted in plans for testing new woods to find out whether they can be used in the pencil industry.

According to some of the manufacturers, the supply of red cedar, which furnishes practically all the wood for the annual output of some 125,000,000 pencils, will be exhausted within five years. A substitute must be found which will whittle easily, which shall contain a large amount of material free of knots, which shall not be porous nor spongy, nor unduly hard, and which shall occur in sufficient quantities to meet the manufacturers' demand.

In view of this the forest service will co-operate in a test of a number of national forest woods. Among those to be tried are Rocky mountain red cedar, alligator juniper, Western juniper, redwood, incense cedar, Western cedar, Port Orford cedar and Alaska cypress. Wood specimens collected from the national forests will be sent to four leading manufacturers, who have agreed to make pencils of them.

The forest service is assisting in this experiment because there are in the national forests large quantities of junipers and cedars which may be suitable for pencil manufacture. For several of these woods no very valuable use has yet been discovered. Foresters believe that in the future the woods from the national forests may, to a considerable extent, come into use to supplement the diminishing stock of Eastern woods, the supply of which has received no protection.
