COSTA RICAN DEATH LIST 1,800 NOW

550 Bodies Recovered at Caracas—Little Food, Clothing or Medicine for Refugees.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, May 7.—Couriers' reports today indicate that the number of dead in the Cartago earthquake will reach 1,800.

It is not known how many of these smaller towns were annihilated. The dead at Cartago are being buried today in the public cemetery.

S. E. CO. TO EVADE TAX

Gormley Will Stand for Compromise That Will Cost County About \$50,000.

The Seattle Electric company and its allied corporations, the Puget Sound Electric company and the Puget Sound Power company, which owe personal taxes for 1907, 1908, and 1909, will pay the taxes if they can get a cut rate.

The Seattle Electric company paid no attention to Gormley's ultimatum. Gormley did considerable talking, but up to date he has confined his entire effort to talk.

Monday or Tuesday the county commissioners will be asked to empower the treasurer and the prosecuting attorney to "shave" the taxes of the tax-dodging electric corporations.

Prince George was proclaimed King of Great Britain and Ireland at St. James palace today, according to ancient custom, by heralds, who with "one voice and the consent of tongue and heart publish and proclaim that the high and mighty Prince George is now, by the death of the late sovereign of happy memory, become our lawful and rightful liege lord, George V., by the grace of God, king of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, defender of the faith and Emperor of India, to whom we do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience, with all hearty and humble affection beseeching God, by whom kings and queens do reign, to bless the royal prince, George V., with long and happy years to reign over us."

GOHL ADMITTED MURDER TO FRIEND

He testified that Gohl premeditated the murder of Hadberg.

MONARCH NOT OVER POPULAR

LONDON, May 7.—When King George took the oath of fealty this afternoon at 4 o'clock, the system of monarchical government in Great Britain went on trial for its life. Statemen went in the national gloom the outlines of a historic crisis. Intermingled with the general sorrow is a note of alarm that cannot be allowed to go unheard.

This became known today when it was learned the royal band played the guard mount before the palace yesterday under the king's order.
