DAILY MENU. Breakfast. Sliced Oranges. Oatmeal and Cream. Scrambled Eggs. Toast. Coffee.

Dinner. Broth. Mutton Pie and Tomatoes. Potato Puffs. String Beans with Cheese. Cold Beet Salad. Cherry Pie. Coffee.

Supper. Kidney Stew. Swelled Potatoes. Baking Powder Biscuit. Strawberries and Cream. Cake. Tea.

Eggs and Leftover Meats. Chop leftover bits of cold bacon, pork or other meat, several kinds may be mixed, and stir them into eggs when scrambling them.

Mutton Pie and Tomatoes. To make a mutton pie with tomatoes, cover the bottom of a baking dish with bread crumbs and fill with alternate layers of sliced cold roast mutton or lamb and peeled and sliced tomatoes.

Swelled Potatoes. Few women know how to make "swelled potatoes," which are considered a great delicacy. Cut the potatoes a little thicker than for Saratoga chips, dry them well.

Puffs. If there's any quantity of cold mashed potatoes left after the Monday dinner they may be served as potato puffs either at luncheon or

SUBSCRIBER. (1) Better send to a professional. (2) Paint with water color. (3) Insert a hot flatiron and press the velvet, which has been placed over wet cotton cloth, over the iron. While it is being steamed in this manner, brush with soft bristle brush. Thus the nap can be brought up and the velvet will look almost like new.

Dear Miss Grey: (1) Should furniture be scrubbed? If so, what should be used in the water? (2) What is good for oily hair?

NEWLY WEDS. (1) Yes, if badly soiled, wash with lukewarm soapy water with a little borax in it. Use a soft flannel cloth. Rinse in clear warm water and rub dry with clean cloth. If rubbed well, no other polish is needed. (2) Frequent shampoos. An occasional dry shampoo with fine cornmeal is good. Sun the hair frequently.
