

# PAWNBROKER RAN SCHOOL OF THIEVERY

### Dickens' Oliver Twist Out- done by Oklahoma City Story of Crime.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Ok., June 6.—Not more successful was the fugitive who tutored Oliver Twist in the art of nipping a "wipe" or a silver snuff box, and who reared the Artful Dodger in the ways of crime, than is E. A. Gomez, Oklahoma City pawnbroker, if the story related by four boys under arrest here is to be believed.

"Gomez taught us to steal," the boys told the police. "We practiced on his safe. He taught us how to place our ears to the big steel door and to listen to the click of the tumblers as we turned the knob. And when we were well schooled, we went out and 'lifted' the things that we saw. Sometimes we only picked up a kodak, sometimes it was a gold watch. We hadn't tackled a safe. The police nabbed us before we got a chance to try our hands at that. Gomez bought what we stole. We sold him stuff that was worth \$100 for \$1 and \$2. We held up pedestrians. Gomez furnished the guns."

Now Gomez is in custody. He is under bond to appear before both the state and United States courts for receiving stolen property. The United States will prosecute him for receiving stamps stolen from an Oklahoma City substitution. The boys admit that they robbed the substitution and they say that Gomez bought the stamps. The face value of the stamps is \$13.75. The lads got \$3.45 for them.

# INSANE MAN HANGS SELF IN WOODS

Hanging with his knees barely off the ground, the body of a man was found suspended from a tree by a slender cord in the woods south of Youngstown today. He had made a hangman's noose in the cord, slipped it around his neck, tied the other end to a tree limb, and then deliberately strangled himself to death by lifting his feet from the ground.

This body was found by L. Shortall, A. Graham and John Braden. The dead man was attired in a cap, overalls, coarse blue shirt, woolen socks and heavy rough shoes. He answered the description of an insane man who has been around Youngstown for several days. This man has caused much fear among women and children in the suburb and a posse made a futile search for him in the woods south of Georgetown yesterday.

# THELIMAN ESCAPES MARSHAL

Taken to the Orthopedic hospital that he might bid goodby to his five-year-old daughter, who is a patient there, R. L. Thielman, alias Darby Thielman, wanted by the federal government to stand trial in Omaha as one of the Maybray gang of fake wrestlers, walked out of the back door of the hospital to liberty yesterday.

Deputy United States Marshal Fred Lathe had acceded to the pleadings of Thielman that he be allowed to see his daughter before he started for Omaha. He was going to plead guilty to his crime and take his punishment at Omaha.

Lathe accompanied him to the room in the hospital in which his daughter was confined. The little girl, suffering from tuberculosis of the spine, strapped to a wooden frame, embraced her father and was frantic in her grief when he told her that he was going away.

Lathe's sympathy was aroused, and he quietly stepped out of the room, leaving father and daughter together for their farewell. Thielman had told Lathe on the way to the hospital that in all probability his daughter would be dead by the time he settled his legal troubles in Omaha.

Lathe looked around the corridors of the hospital and decided that there was no means of escape. He then went outside the hospital and stood by the entrance. After he had given Thielman sufficient time for a farewell he went back to the room. The daughter was there but Thielman was gone. A search was made, but Thielman could not be found. It is believed that he left by a rear door of the hospital.

Indicted at Omaha.  
Thielman was arrested in Seattle three weeks ago upon an indictment returned against him by the federal grand jury at Omaha, charging him with misusing the United States mails. He was to be taken to Omaha for trial this week.

In the county jail Thielman denied being a principal in the fake wrestling and pugilistic contests. He intended, however, according to his wife, to plead guilty, and expected but a few months' imprisonment. No clue as to Thielman's whereabouts has been secured since he left the Orthopedic hospital.

# M'INTYRE LOSES

(Concluded.)

Abandoned Partnership.  
Lindsay decided that McIntyre had abandoned the partnership long before the trade; that the statute of limitations and the doctrine of laches prevented him from maintaining such a suit.

"I find no equity in the bill brought by McIntyre, and it will be dismissed." With these words Commissioner Lindsay closed the first chapter in the largest mining litigation ever tried in King county. An appeal will probably be taken by McIntyre.

In his decision Lindsay scored the attorneys for their acrimonious conduct during the trial, and also reprimanded Johnson for the suppression of testimony. Other witnesses were named who the court declared were unworthy of belief. He also denounced Johnson for bringing his wife into the litigation.

McIntyre was represented by Jay C. Allen and Wilmore Tucker. Johnson's attorneys were John B. Hart and Thomas W. Dovel.

I am a harsh and rude to go to the people should be nice. But would you be nice if some gang was trying to run a steam roller over you? I am going to tell the truth and defy contradiction.

I DID NOT GIVE UP  
I knew that some day I would get a public investigation of this Dental Board, but when? For years I did not know what night would come to sleep in the county jail. I knew the great political power behind the dental combine and the venerable respectability in front of them, and I knew the law and power of the state under which they were and are weak are often crushed because of their want of dollars (since of course I do not have them) and the people for moral and financial support and I have won a moral victory. The investigation has vindicated me in every particular.

AN INVESTIGATION AFTER LAST  
I have succeeded after seven years in getting an investigation of the Washington Dental Board, and the Honorable Legislative Committee has made a report which is a public record.

WHAT I AM GOING TO PROVE  
I am going to prove by this public record that the Dental Board has taken twenty-five dollars extra from one man and issued his license when he had no right to have it, according to their records.

I am going to prove by this public record that the Dental Board has taken just twice as much commission as the law allows them.

I am going to show that the public record that this board has taken twelve two and four hundred dollars worth of fees from the dentists who were examined at Spokane last November.
