Two other persons were painfully but not seriously burned in the fire.

June 6, 1799, Patrick Henry died. Patrick was a Virginian. Having failed at store-keeping and farming, he became a lawyer and a congressman. For a hundred years he has exclaimed on Friday afternoons in the school houses all across this broad land: "Give me liberty or give me death." But now the muckraker has been turned on history's pages, and the same jealousy of other greatness which tells us that George Washington did not cut down the cherry tree insists that Mr. Henry's speech on the stamp act did not include the popular Friday afternoon rendition. Anyway, he did not get either then, for he was four times afterward governor of Virginia.

CHICAGO.—San Francisco has been selected as the site of three new universities to be founded by the Jesuit order. The other cities are New Orleans and Boston. Plans for the universities are completed.

SAN FRANCISCO.—Catcher Orendorf, of the Los Angeles team, was struck on the head by a pitched ball in the morning game yesterday and was taken to a hospital, where he may die.

DENVER.—Al Short, chief clerk of the Seattle Hotel, Seattle, was

selected second vice-president of the National Association of Greater, in convention here.

OLYMPIA.—Floods and washouts cost the Northern Pacific \$361,202 in this state last year, according to figures filed today.

PORTLAND, Ore.—Portland's annual celebration, the rose carnival, began today with the arrival of "Rex Oregonus" at the city at noon.

VANCOUVER, Wash.—The sun shone bright on Decoration day and Chester Millington, a schoolboy, went swimming in the Columbia river. His back was burned so badly he is kept in his room, and studies lying flat on his stomach. He is swathed in cotton batting soaked with oils.

RICHMOND, Va.—Charles E. Doyle, vice-president in charge of operation of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad, died in his car, following a stroke of apoplexy, on his way to Richmond, yesterday.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—Mrs. Lovina Straight, known during the civil war as the "angel of the 1st Indiana regiment," and the widow of Gen. A. D. Straight, died yesterday, aged 80.

WASHINGTON.—Treasury officials figure that if all money in circulation in this country were divided evenly, every man, woman and child would have \$34.58.

NEW YORK.—To see with her

own eyes the conditions under which men work who are building the Catskill aqueduct to New York, Anne Morgan, the daughter of J. P. Morgan, went 500 feet underground yesterday and talked for hours with gangs of Italians and negroes.

LONDON.—The international horse show, with 10,000 entries and a list of prizes aggregating \$70,000, opened today. It was planned to have Col. Roosevelt preside at the opening, but all ceremonies were eliminated because of the recent death of King Edward.

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—Henry A. Gannett, of Seneca Falls, was killed and several others seriously injured when a trolley car on the Geneva and Auburn road skidded on wet rails last night and overturned at a switch.

FRESNO, Cal.—It has been discovered that Mrs. Martin, wife of Dr. Jackson L. Martin, who died Tuesday, killed herself. She inhaled gas, and was revived by her husband. He left the house and she drank corrosive sublimate.

NEW YORK.—William A. Miner, president of the William A. Miner company, of Chicago, was robbed of \$50,000 in a Pullman sleeper en route to New York. The money was in a traveling bag by his side in the berth.

CHICAGO.—Harry Eulberg, 37, climbed an electric light pole after a bird's nest yesterday and was electrocuted in sight of his younger brother. His legs were nearly burned off.

CINCINNATI.—Climbing down a rope ladder three stories, 14-year-old Stella Ivy, daughter of a marshal of a local court, joined her lover, Albert Hinkle, also 14, and departed in search of a marriage license, Saturday night. All trace of the children has been lost.
