

OLD VIOLIN MAKER IS DEAD

Funeral services for W. W. Oakes, "the old violin man," were held this morning at Bonney-Watson's, attended by many persons of musical note. Mr. Oakes died suddenly Friday while fishing along the Snohomish river with F. N. Fraser. Fraser found him lying peacefully on the bank.

Oakes spent all his life making violins. He was a revolutionist in some respects, casting aside all the traditions of Stradivarius, the Paganinis, Cremonas. He contended that age had nothing to do with the tone qualities of violins, and that one wood was as good as another. In fact, the violin which he considered to be his masterpiece was made of willow, while another was made of ebony. Oakes lived and died convinced that the day would come when his theories of violin making would be generally accepted.

He leaves a daughter, Mrs. A. D. Fraser, 1114 37th av. N., and a nephew, E. L. Oakes, 3840 19th av. S. W.

Aberdeen.—A telephone line has been established by the government from Meclips to the Hoh river, 40 miles.

Springfield, Ill.—Miss Irene Dodge, of Norman, Ill., was killed, and Her. Man Scantlan, of Athens, severely injured when an automobile driven by the Rev. Father Moore of Athens, was struck by a street car last night.

Olympia.—Two superior judges handed in their resignations to Gov. Hay yesterday. They were Judge J. A. Shackelford of Pierce county and Judge Henry Canfield of Whitman.

Montgomery, Ala.—Judge Julius Richardson, of the Second Judicial circuit, a widely known jurist, was killed in an automobile accident near here yesterday.

Salem, Or.—T. G. Eligh, manager of a moving picture theatre, was arrested yesterday for exhibiting the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures.

Eight decrees of divorce were granted in Seattle yesterday.

Port Townsend.—The first strong

arm work here in 20 years occurred last night when a bibulous logger named Wells was assaulted by a soldier whose post he had been on a tour of the restricted district. The soldier has not returned to the post and probably has deserted.

Twelve deaths were recorded in Seattle yesterday.

Dallas, Texas.—The Texas republicans yesterday named J. O. Terrell, of San Antonio, for governor. J. W. Cooke, of Waco, for attorney general, and Harry Masterson, of Houston, for lieutenant governor.

Revelstoke, B. C.—Charles H. Shaw, professor of biology in the University of Pennsylvania, was drowned yesterday in Kinbasket lake.

Boston.—Fire last night destroyed 10,000,000 feet of lumber and five brick buildings, causing a loss of \$1,000,000. The first general alarm since the great fire of 1872 was sounded in ten minutes after the first alarm last night.

Chicago.—Two accidents marred the Knights Templar celebration yesterday. Herman Greshmann, of Chicago, on his way to join his command, was caught between two cars and crushed to death. William Hackett, of Fosteria, O., was thrown from his horse and is expected to die.

Washington, D. C.—The population of Houston, Tex., has been announced as 78,800, an increase of 74 per cent over 1900, when the population was 44,833.
