

MARY'S COOK BOOK

HAMBURG ROAST. Make a dressing of stale bread soaked until soft. Then squeeze the water off and season with a little pepper, salt, sage, 1 egg and a few bits of butter. Stir it into your meat and put into a greased tin; add a little hot water and bake about 1 1/2 hours. One pound of steak is plenty for four.

BAKED ONIONS WITH CHEESE. Peel and cut in 1/2-inch slices, large white onions. Parboil in salted water, drain, and arrange on a buttered baking dish, with bits of butter, and bake until soft; then sprinkle with salt, pepper and a layer of grated cheese. Return to the oven long enough to melt the cheese.

STRING BEAN SALAD. Cut boiled string beans in short lengths and arrange them on crisp lettuce leaves. Sprinkle with chopped chives and pour French dressing over it and serve cold.

CREAM PEACH PIE. Line a deep pie plate with rich pie crust, peel and cut in small cubes enough peaches to come well up to the top of the plate. First dredge a little flour over the pie crust after you put it on the plate and sprinkle a tablespoon of sugar over that. Then put in peaches, and if not very sweet sprinkle over them another tablespoon sugar. Bake until the peaches are tender. When cooked set aside to cool. When wanted whip a cup of heavy cream with a tablespoon of sugar and half teaspoon of vanilla extract. Spread the cream high on the pie and serve cold.


