
The Labor Journal, Bellingham, says:

TOLSTOY WAS 82 SATURDAY



MOSCOW, Sept. 12.—Count Leo Tolstoy Saturday celebrated the 82nd anniversary of his birth. The aged Russian philosopher and teacher, most bitterly hated by Russian autocracy and so well loved by his host of friends in and out of Russia, is too feeble to permit a demonstration in his behalf, even were the czar's government lenient enough to allow it.

In his peasant home, 150 miles south of Moscow, the count received congratulations of his admirers from all over the world. None but members of his immediate family were by his side as he lay in the invalid chair which has been home for him for the past two years.

He received many cables from America congratulating him upon having arrived at four score and two years, and expressing the wish that many more years should be allotted him.

Thaw Fighting Again. NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Architect Stanford White, will resume his fight for liberty next month. Under the direction of Attorney Sneren, Thaw is spending several hours a day in elaborate preparations for habeas corpus proceedings.

Slays Girl and Self. ABERDEEN, S. D., Sept. 12.—Inspired by jealousy, Jay Harbinson, aged 26 years, shot at Dr. Boyd Glinke, a young dentist, then killed his sweetheart, Adele Kiser, in the home of the girl's parents here last night. Harbinson then put a bullet into his own brain.

Nine Killed in Tunnel. NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The coroner today reported that nine laborers met death in a tunnel cave-in at Jersey City yesterday.
