

# JOE CANNON WILL BE NOMINATED TOMORROW, BUT A SMALL CLOUD THREATENS HIM

Speaker Will Wipe Out Republican Opponent at Primaries, But a Popular Democrat May Run Independently and Give Him Hard Fight for Election.

DANVILLE, Ill., Sept. 14.—There is a chance that Joe Cannon will not be able to "come back." It is a mere ghost of a chance, almost as slender as the proverbial chance of the snowball in hell, but it is a chance. It is conceivable that things may break in such a way as to put an end to Cannonism right here in the last place on earth one would naturally look to see Uncle Joe's finish.

The remote possibility rests on the chance that Judge E. R. Kimbrough will stand as an independent candidate for representative. There are those here who believe that he will. Some of these believe also that he can be elected.

Now, there is practically no such thing as a real insurgent in this district. Nearly half a century of agitated Cannonism has given the electorate a bred-in-the-bone bias

toward casting ballots for Cannon. It is second nature for them to vote that way. They know what happens to them if they don't. They have all seen the lash or have seen the specific scourge literally driven from the district by it.

So the insurgent—in the sense of an enemy of Cannonism as a national issue—is almost unknown here.

But there is a species of insurgent here, nevertheless. One cannot hold a seat in congress for 36 years, largely by virtue of judicious use of federal patronage, without making many enemies. Where the national cap is freely dispensed, those who seek the favor of the almoner multiply. There are always more would-be postmasters, consuls, consular agents, cadets, government printing employees and the like than there are jobs.

In 36 years a congressman, he be never so influential and liberal with patronage, must bitterly disappoint a great many of these patriots.

Joe Cannon has made his share of enemies in that way. There are a good many of them scattered over the district. They stand ready to knife Cannon, if there ever comes a time when they can feel reasonably safe in doing it.

These "sore heads" are the best that the district can offer in the way of insurgents. Their vote, plus that of the democracy of the district, is the only hope of those who are backing Judge Kimbrough.

Kimbrough is an old line democrat, wealthy, conservative and oratorical. He is popular, and is splendid on the stump. He would undoubtedly make a strong candidate. As a democratic candidate Judge Kimbrough would have no chance whatever, as no 18th district republican in his right mind could ever be persuaded to vote for a democrat, but as an independent candidate his chance might be better than would appear.


