VOTES FOR WOMEN

Here's an unusual letter that came to me: "Dear Madam: I have always been opposed, or at least indifferent, to woman suffrage, because I am happily married, and the mother of three sweet little girls, and I have always felt that a mother's place was in the home. "But several days ago Alice Stone Blackwell's 'Twelve Reasons' came to me, in which I find this statement: 'Because in the laws now upon our statute books, the reasonable wishes of women are not adequately represented. "Witness the laws in relation to the age of consent, which regard a little girl as mature enough to consent to her own ruin at 10 or 12 years of age—in Delaware 7.' "Is it possible that there are such unspeakable laws in place in the civilized world? How did they happen to become laws in the first instance?"

"No mother should rest at night while there are such laws in any state in our Union. "If that statement is correct, I will work every minute until election to help win the right to change such infamous laws. "MRS. A. Z. WRIGHT." Answer: That statement is correct. The average "age of consent" in most states has been 10 years. Delaware must have fixed the age at 7 to fit some special man's case. In all the suffrage states the age of consent is 18, and that is the first law that women have had passed after they got the ballot. Strangely enough, it is a very difficult matter to raise the age of consent where women do not vote. Why? I don't know. My point of view is different from a man's—I cannot answer.

HUSBAND AND WIFE IN DUEL TO THE DEATH

LAKE CHARLES, Va., Oct. 11.—A duel between husband and wife, he armed with a shotgun and she with a revolver, was the death setting for Dr. B. Temple Smith, who is dead here from wounds inflicted by Mrs. Smith in the duel on the morning of September 25. To set green, blue, lavender and other colors in wash goods, soak in water before washing, soak in water to a tub of water. Black, blue and gray should be soaked in strong salted water. To keep white silk gloves and waists from turning yellow, wash carefully in the usual way, then add one tablespoonful wood alcohol to the washwater. Dust and dampness soon discolor the most expensive settings, and make them shabby. Clean them with soap and water with an old tooth brush. Their brilliancy should be quite restored by this treatment.

Inventor of "Double" Veil Returns to Suffrage Work

Here is a new way to clean jewelry. Rub the articles to be cleaned with a chamomile, on which you have rubbed a little of the soft hair manicure paste. Continued scrubbing with a brush will remove a natural wood kitchen table. It may be cleaned even better without roughing it by using half a lemon and then rinsing with hot water. Equal parts of turpentine and ammonia will remove paint from clothing. Soak the spot in the mixture and then rub it hard; dip in ammonia and rub it again. Almost any paint can be removed in this way. About twice a day dip a rag into hot and rub the range before it cools. The nickel part and heating coil will only need an occasional rub with the greased cloth. Use a damp cloth to keep this in order. It is much quicker and easier than the usual way of polishing and has the advantage of not rubbing off.

Dear Miss Grey—Could you please tell me how I could remove the marks of mold from books and still retain their natural color? Would rebinding be more expensive than buying new ones? MAY. You might try benzine, but I doubt if the mold can be removed successfully. Rebinding is less expensive.

Dear Miss Grey—I have a natural color pongee dress that has stained from a baby carriage. I have tried benzine and that only makes the cloth look a little lighter. What could I use to clean it with? CONSTANT READER. It does not injure pongee to wash it with soap and water. If the stains are from grease, cover with French chalk for a few hours, then apply blotting paper and iron with a hot iron. Another remedy is a solution composed of equal parts of ether, ammonia and alcohol.

Dear Miss Grey—Will you please tell me what I should have said or done in the following instance: When traveling by boat, a girl friend and myself were joined by a young man friend, who, when the fare was collected, paid our fares. Should I have allowed him to pay my fare without comment, or should I have insisted upon paying my own way? MARTHA G. If the amount is insignificant and the young man insists, he may be allowed to pay the fare, though the young lady should offer to do so first.

Dear Miss Grey—I am a young man and have been introduced to a number of young ladies, but they do not recognize me anywhere. Some have been introduced three times and still we are strangers. Is it not improper of me to speak to, or even try to remember those girls? IGNORANT BILL. If the young ladies fail to recognize you after three introductions you are justified in concluding that they do not care to continue the acquaintance.

Dear Miss Grey—Will you kindly publish recipes for chill con carne with beans, Mexican tamales and cream puffs? Tamales. Cut large green peppers in two parts crosswise; scrape out the seeds and place the shells in salt and water for half an hour. Make a mixture of tomatoes, either canned or fresh, and bread crumbs, seasoned with salt, pepper, tomato catchup and table sauce. Stuff the shells with this and tie the two parts together with a string. Boil for half an hour. A variation of this is to stuff the peppers with chopped meat instead of the dressing given above. They are very good stuffed with chopped chicken. Sometimes the small end is cut off. Stuff as before stated and bake. Cream Puffs. Melt 1/2 cup butter in 1 cup of hot water; while boiling stir in 1 cup of flour, then cool; when cold, stir in 3 unbeaten eggs, one at a time; drop in buttered tins and bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. Filling for Puffs—1 cup milk, 3 tablespoons of sugar, 2 tablespoons of corn starch, 1 egg, boil a few minutes, flavor when cold. A great favorite. I have no recipe for chile con carne.
