

Hay's Defense of Hand Picked Candidates Is Shattered

For the past week Governor M. E. Hay has been carrying on a defense of the "hand picked" candidates for the supreme court, and at the same time attacking the Non-Partisan Judiciary League. The attacks on the league which bear the governor's name were written by C. Will Shaffer, the author of the bill which removed the nomination of supreme court candidates from the direct primary.

The Non-Partisan League has written an open letter to the governor asking him for categorical denials of every accusation made by the league. So far the governor's (Shaffer's) denials have been of inconsequential couched in language intended to convey a denial of everything. Here are the questions sent to the governor by registered mail, to which no reply has been received:

They Ask Questions.
Do you deny that Frank T. Post, a corporation lawyer, was one of the earliest advocates of the amendment to the direct primary law whereby the nomination of supreme court judges was taken from the people?

Do you deny that the judicial convention law as presented to the legislature was drawn by C. Will Shaffer, an appointee and servant of the supreme court?

Do you deny that justices of the supreme court requested members of the house and senate to vote for the bill?

Do you deny that Speaker Meigs was opposed to the bill, but that he was prevailed upon to change his position by two members of the court?

Do you deny that, when the bill went to you for approval, you opposed the convention feature of it, and had a message written vetoing it, but that members of the supreme court prevailed on you to change your mind and sign it?

Do you deny that members of the supreme court exerted themselves to prevent the repeal of the judicial convention law by the special legislature of 1907?

None Protested.
Do you deny that, while five justices of the supreme court accepted a nomination from the Tacoma convention of August 3, not one of them, although some of them were actually present in the convention hall, lifted his voice in protest when that convention rejected a resolution pledging the republican party to the repeal of the judicial convention law?

Do you deny that, while the candidates of the Independent Non-Partisan Judiciary party stand pledged, in case the nomination of

supreme court judges is by the next legislature restored to the people, to resign before the primary election of 1912, and submit the question of their renomination and re-election to the voters of the state, the candidates of the Tacoma convention have thus far ignored a formal request that they make a similar pledge?

The foregoing are plain questions, couched in unmistakable language, and, as you have made it necessary to ask them, they demand plain and unmistakable answers at your hands. "The people of this state will pardon many shortcomings of their governor, but they do expect him to speak the truth, even when defending a court to one of whose questionable decisions he owes his position."
