

ATTEND THE ANTI-VICE MASS MEETING AT THE ARCADE HALL TONIGHT

Seattle's decency will assert itself in a mass meeting tonight in Arcade Hall. The women of Seattle, disgusted by the disclosures of official rottenness, will assemble tonight to voice their protest against the vile conditions fostered by Gill, Wappenstein and their defenders.

Tonight's meeting will attempt to wipe out as much as possible the stain that rests on the name of the city. It will be a declaration that 95 per cent of the people of this city are clean, decent men and women. It will be a telling proof for all those who, under the guise of respectability, openly

aid and abet the Gill-Wappenstein regime of polluted graft. Seattle is not rotten, except officially; Seattle is not made up of men and women who profit by the dirty dollars collected below the line; Seattle is not peopled by men and women who look to dead fall gambling hells for their livelihood.

And these men and women will meet tonight to make plain to all the world that they are decent, respectable and God-fearing. These men and women cannot be trifled with by the frantic efforts of those who shared in the vile vice-feeding to hush up the scandal. They are going to

remove the cause; they are going to root out the officials responsible for the conditions, and they will do it in plain view of all the world, for their own self respect and the self respect of the city. It takes a long time to stir the decent citizens of a community to united wrath, but

once this is done, there is nothing that can successfully oppose them. Tonight's meeting will be the culmination of the de-bauching of Seattle by Gill, Wappenstein, the vice syndicate and their official defender. Tonight the people of Seattle will tell Gill and the rest of the gang in no unambiguous words that their time has come.
