

NO HOPE THAT MINERS LIVE

BLACK DIAMOND, Nov. 9.—The search is on for bodies now, not men. Every hope that the five men in the bowels of the Lawson mine are alive has been abandoned and from now on the search will be waged only to give back to loved ones the bodies of their beloved.

When rescue gangs attempted to go below the third level yesterday, the deadly after-damp was encountered. After-damp is a gas which neutralizes all oxygen. Even the five miners on the sixth level escaped death when the terrific explosion occurred, their lives must have been snuffed out by the fatal after-damp.

It is expected that the bodies of the men caught in the mine car just about to descend will be brought to the surface in a few days. An up-cast from the south shaft to the main slope is being pushed rapidly. It is expected that all bodies near the surface will be found.

Mee rushed out and grabbed the men, who proved to be two of Mee's most intimate friends. "Oh," said one of them, "it's all a mistake. We thought you lived in that house."

TODAY IN HISTORY

NOV. 9, 1799.—Napoleon abolished the French directory. The directory thought it was the government in France, but Napoleon convinced it that its chief use was to name the directorate gowns after. And he called himself first consul of France.

Aberdeen.—While boarding his vessel here last night, A. Johnson, cook on board the schooner A. B. Johnson, fell overboard and was drowned. His brother is master of the ship.

Walla Walla.—Arkansas Black apples, grown in this section, are coming in for a heavy demand in the southern states. The reason is that the negroes prefer highly colored fruit.

Salt Lake City.—Thomas Cannel, formerly band master of the royal household of England and a warm personal friend of the late Queen Victoria, is dead here at the age of 90.

Belton, N. H.—A three-cornered gun fight that grew out of a quarrel over a lawsuit has resulted in the death of Frank Ellington, a farmer. Ellington was shot by Henry and Jack Pittman, brothers, who were themselves wounded.

According to figures compiled by the registrar of the University of Washington, 1,913 students were enrolled this semester by November 1. Men constitute 60 per cent of the enrollment. Twenty-three per cent of the students are entirely self-supporting, 32 per cent is partially self-supporting. The rest are dependent upon their parents or guardians.
