Hats off to the old master. Hurry Up Yost came back so fast that football critics have not yet recovered their breath.

They had Michigan all in, down and out time and again. When dinky college teams played the Wolverines to a tie, or held them almost even, supporters of Penn and Minnesota winked and said, "Wait till we get at them."

Well, they got at them, and what's the answer? Yost is again supreme. With an eleven that rounded into form slowly, he held Pennsylvania, by many considered the strongest eleven in the East, to a scoreless tie. Some critics insist the Wolverines played a better game than Penn, and had the red and blue on the defensive most of the time. Be that as it may, Michigan invaded the East and returned home with honor.

Then against Minnesota, pounds heavier to the man, the Michigan eleven proved its class. For three periods the eleven battled back and forth. Although both goals were threatened, neither was crossed until shortly before the end of play in the fourth period.

It was just before time was called that Yost, crouching along the side line, signaled, and a moment later Wells shot the ball to Borieske for

20 yards. It was a beautiful pass, unexpected and successful. Like a flash the Wolverines lined up again. Again the ball went, Wells to Borieske. If the first pass was unlooked for, the second was a bolt from the blue—and the ball was on the 8-yard line, from where Wells planted it behind the Gopher goal posts in two bucks.

Now I wonder where the men who have been yelling for Yost's retirement will hide? There has been a crowd shouting for the dismissal of the great coach for the past two or three years, contending new football was beyond the man who gave the university a place on the football map. Under the circumstances I imagine these men will clap stoppers on their jaw tackle, at least for the present.
