

MILLER'S FLIPFLOPS RESULT OF FEAR

M. D. Miller, held in durance vile for 40 days by Chief Wapenstein because the latter feared him as a witness before the graft investigation committee, has turned several startling mental and verbal flipflops since Superior Judge Ronald ordered his release.

Before going to the superior court, after Judge J. M. Glasgow forced Wappy to deliver the prisoner, Miller was taken to the chief's office. What passed between Wappy and the man he held under cover as long as he dared is not known.

After his discharge Miller expressed a wish to see Wappy. Patrolman Opdyke, before this wish was voiced, was most solicitous, and piled Miller with "smokes." Also Opdyke and Miller walked from the court house to Wappy's office together. What passed between them is not known. The fact remains that Miller went straight to Wappy's private office. What

passed between them is known. The whole interview in a nut shell was the effect that Miller laughed and said he had "conned" Blaine and Kellogg of the investigating committee into the belief that he knew something about graft in the police department.

Now mark this: Within three hours, in the presence of Chairman Kellogg, Judge Glasgow and three newspaper men, two of whom were present when Miller was in Wappy's office after his discharge, he denied absolutely having seen Wappy at all that afternoon.

Of course the public has no means of knowing what promises, if any, were held from Miller during the time he walked from the court house to Wappy's office after his release.

Miller's mental flipflops can only be explained on the ground that he sides with the police to escape their wrath.


